I always love having you on man I and you know, we haven't just had you on about human trafficking, like we've had you on just to come in and talk about technology. You're actually a video game developer and not many people realize I'm we always typically talk about the VR a little bit. But we'll be getting into that some more, because you just put out a whole new

walkthrough, and you're looking at making trapped VR a detective story into an app that people can play and access. So before we get into the technology, before we get into trapped a VR detective story, let's get into human trafficking real quick, and what it's all about? What is human trafficking? And how can people spot it?

Wow. Well, first of all, thank you so much for the introduction and for understanding exactly, you know why this is so important. So human trafficking is essentially someone taking advantage of someone else on an extreme level. So there are there's a definition essentially, that has been put together by three different components, which is actions, means and purpose. And so those three things are important. Because inaction is actually providing somebody or getting access to somebody means is doing it through force fraud or coercion, and then a purpose as far as for it to be a commercial act. So basically, if you're forcing someone to do something against their will, where you are, you are benefiting from. So that is that is the essential issue that's out there. Now, if you're under 18, you do not have to prove means you just have to prove that someone was provided for an exchange of value. And this can either be for labor trafficking, or sex trafficking in the case of domestic minor sex trafficking without the means required, such as action and purpose. So it's exchanging somebody's efforts for your benefit. And so there's

Yeah, and it's horrifying to know that human trafficking goes into so many different aspects of our lives that we really don't think about. Most people are aware of, you know, massage parlors, and the possibility of human trafficking, you know, human trafficking of children, for pedophile rings, things like that. But when you're talking about labor, trafficking as well, and people, even right here in the neighborhood that I live in, in Austin, that have been brought in, and because they've been brought in now, oh, a means by which to do that. Now, granted, that's human smuggling, not human trafficking, because it wasn't done by means of coercion. And I think that's, that's something that we need to talk about real quick, just to clear it up for the audience.

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Really great point, right. So the difference that you're describing is basically human smuggling versus human trafficking. So smuggling is actually someone being brought across a border or a transnational border. So that person could be doing that on their own volition, like, they may have paid somebody to do this. And so there's their own decision, or they could have been kidnapped across the border, for example. But those things are separate than if you're actually going to be earning money from that person yourself, or if you're going to be benefiting from that. So I'm not exactly sure if I'm doing a great job of describing this. But if there is a I probably should start over on that one. So I want to make

I mean, this stuff can happen so innocently like that, and turns into a huge problem all the way up to like multinational corporations that are taking advantage of people through the HDA and HTB visa programs.

And this is just one tiny microcosm that has actually been looked at how to mean edit, I mean, lightly looked at um, this is this whole system that we are working under right now is unbelievably corrupt. And so your your eyes are just open as much as they can as soon as they can. But just pay attention eat as soon as we can. Hour like we want to be treated. Are we since an

And until and until you admit that you have a problem, you can't fix the problem until you admit like, you know, I probably shouldn't drink anymore. You may have a problem stopping drinking, like you, you have to be committed to the solution. And I guess, moving forward here, Billy. Because you, you had your own experience with human trafficking, you weren't traffic yourself, but you you actively had your children groomed at one point by somebody that you know, which is what caused you to become the visceral activist in the world that you are now and start using the talents that you had in the world of programming things like that to marry the, the experience with education.

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Yeah, yeah, thanks, I appreciate you giving me the opportunity to talk about that. So Jackie, and I, my wife and I, we went to a big conference in Dallas A while back, and it was for the Texas Department of protective Family Services. DFPS. And we were honored to be asked

there, because it was invited an invite only conference. So we got the chance to speak to so many people that were out there. And they would tell us why they were involved, you know, in this fight. You know, they were with the, you know, they're with Child Protective Services, or they were volunteers or nurses or whatever. And they told us some stories about the people that they were working with, and the kids that we're working with, and adults who were working with, that were just absolutely horrendous. And, as we were, you know, kind of sharing our stories. You know, the thread that just kept coming through to me was that everybody has been dealing with vulnerable populations, you know, kids, adults, people that are in circumstances that they're, they're out of their control. And that that really is like the commonality to all of this. And so you know, one of the things that I've always worked for is trying to, to educate people about this, so that they can, they can avoid this so they can actually have it, prevent and happen to somebody else. We're trying to at least radical empathy. What we're trying to do with our stuff is we're trying to educate people so that we can prevent this from happening to them, so they can actually understand the kind of vulnerability that they might have. So I got started in this because I found out that when I was working on a project with a longtime friend of mine, who was my boss, he and I would be talking on the phone sometimes, and sometimes he'd call the house and talk to me or talk to my kids, and then they'd hand the phone to me or, you know, my wife, etc. He'd known the kids forever. But it turned out that, you know, one day my son came to me and said, hey, you know, why is he talking to me about what porn sites I'm supposed to visit? And I'm like, What are you talking about? Your daughter comes to us and said, you know, why is this guy talking to us about you know how I'm supposed to, you know, clean my vagina. And I was like, that is so messed up. incredibly long story short. I never got paid what I was owed. You know, I got fired. The kids said that he didn't cross some lines. So he totally got away with you and the whole thing. And we were told that that was called grooming. So apparently, he was talking to them about, you know, their body parts and trying to normalize talking about sex and promising them to go. It's really expensive places and take them on, you know, on, you know, excursions and things like this. And the police explained to us that that was called grooming. And I didn't, I couldn't find any resources that made any sense to me that I felt would really educate me about the situation. Most of the stuff that I found was like a PDF, or you could, you know, watch a video of somebody reading a PowerPoint to you. And so, years later, I got into using virtual reality. And I found out that it actually could make people care if you created a situation that could connect you with the person that you were having that experience with. So I decided I was going to build an experience that would actually teach you how anyone could become a victim of human trafficking through psychological manipulation. So I built that experience in virtual reality, so you can actually meet this young girl named Lisa, and you would become, you know, accustomed to knowing that her life was normal and regular. But this actually happened to her because she got manipulated by a boy that she met online. It's an extremely common situation right now. This is not a you grab somebody out of a parking lot at a target is more of somebody gets to understand that you have some vulnerabilities. And they promised to make those vulnerabilities kind of go away. So it's like, if you're lonely, they'll come in and offer you, you know, attention and affection. Or if you're poor, they might offer you money and things like that. And so by fulfilling those little objectives for you that you don't realize there's so much vulnerabilities that can put you at risk of being taken advantage of, and that really is kind of the the core nugget of what we're trying to teach people is you have to actually be paying attention to these type of things so that your vulnerabilities don't become ultimately something that can harm you long term.

Yeah, absolutely. Yeah. It's, it's, it's hard because there, there is a level of experience that is hard to translate through through something virtual or through a game or even through a narration when it when it comes to somebody being so emotionally manipulated, because it really is, once again, that is the difference between smuggling and trafficking is the coercion. That's true, the fact that he has, you can have the exact same things done to somebody who has been quoted over to America and is living three streets over for me right now. And has to go do this forest work every day, for 1213 hours a day with maybe one water break, and maybe a lunch. And then they go back and keep working, keep working, keep working while they make no money. But they're living in a house for free. It doesn't

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even seem real to have this conversation and believe that's actually happening. And yeah, we know it's happening to millions of people. Yeah, across America. Oh, absolutely. I mean, this is not like some manufactured, you know, alarm things like going, No, we all know it's happening. Why does that not bother us? Do you see what I'm saying?

We're seeing interest from universities right now. That's awesome, dude. It's really exciting. We just had a real successful conference earlier this year called the greater Rockies interactive training conference where uprising actually had oh wow, you They debuted trapped VR detective story up there for for their week of conference, which was absolutely fantastic. From there, we've met with people from inside out in Montana, and we have also met with God, excuse me, with the lifeguard group out of Montana, and they are absolutely fantastic. Both those groups are great. And we are really looking forward to seeing things explode with them, they've been taking ourselves out to

I think it's one of those and we've had numerous private conversations, Billy about the idea of taking this to high schools, junior High's, things like that. And you have actively gone that far. You went out to California and did some testbed stuff. We things like that, because Because human trafficking curricula is an embedded part of education in California.

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Yep, it is. I wish we were more embedded in California. But what I was what I was gonna say is, yeah, the groups that we just just gotten gotten to start working with. So the lifeguard group, for example. They actually go and do live presentations for giant auditoriums. So it's the lifeguard group Gu ARD group. Okay. And they have they have already done presentations for like over 10,000 students, and they go all over rural America. So So they act, they're actually doing the hard work of reaching, you know, kids a small group at a time. And that's so absolutely important to be able to bring experts on site. Oh, yeah. And if you think about what they can do with our VR program, what they're doing is they're bringing an expert along with them. Yeah, multiplied by however many headsets they have. You know, and that person gets a one on one conversation with a victim, and they can understand from their point of view, wow, what their life was like, wow. Wow, it's a super powerful experience.

How can I mean? How could How can you provide that learning at scale? Yeah, you can't. You have to just impossible to do and I mean, you'd have to have how many people crossing the entire universe all the time that were never injured, and then they would be perfectly healthy every single time?

That's what I'm on a stage in front of 1000s of people are in front of a camera for 1000s of people to watch, which may have happened to them during their captivity, you know, like a VA. In reality, what I did is I just wanted to find out how cruel justice instructors were teaching about human trafficking, if at all, and to understand that I needed to under I needed to know where they got their knowledge about the topic from

or and also, what it is that they knew and how they were sharing that the classroom. So at the end of the day, what I ended up with after doing different interviews and asking some open ended questions, I ended up finding out that essentially, for the most part, criminal justice instructors, like a majority of other instructors are not sharing hardly anything about human trafficking. And it didn't surprise me because I had a doing this study, I actually read more than 5000 pages in 11 Different Criminal Justice textbooks and found that less than 1% Were actually I think it was exactly 1% of the pages covered anything with human trafficking. Wow. And that was really, yeah. So you talked about students getting introduced to 5000 pages of tech.

So in the criminal justice textbooks, when I learned it was intro to Criminal Justice, and criminology courses, which are the courses throughout all of academia throughout all higher ed, those are the courses where human trafficking would be taught the most, because criminal justice is the division where human trafficking is taught the most. And in that division, where you will get the most news, where you get the most the books that were being used for those courses. Only 1% of the pages had any content to do with human trafficking. And that doesn't mean that the entire page was covered with content. It just means that it mentioned it and mentioning could be any. Yeah, I could go off on a tangent. I think I

In our sense, of course, because it is a thing that's so commonly confused, because so many people, when they think about human trafficking, they think about just what you were saying, the most lenient kidnapping, and they forget these things like coercion, and the things like vulnerabilities and risk factors. So that that's why the PBJ course is really so important. Because you could spend \$100,000, getting yourself a four year degree and say, I know everything there is to know about criminal justice. And you would have been taught maybe one page about human trafficking. And then when I told you that there was a law on human trafficking, you'd say, I don't believe so. And many people would say that, and even if they said that there was a law, most people like like their instructors, I talked to focus on sex trafficking, they might know that labor trafficking is a thing, but they can't give you that definition. So you know, 15 minutes into the tvj course, you already know that definition. We hammered home, we could do an activity, we show you examples. We have big things flashing on the screen. So it really is, it was really pretty alarming to me that in 15 minutes, we could have a course that could teach you that there is a definition of human trafficking, whereas there's these different these different college level courses. And they were doing nothing to make sure that you knew about human trafficking. Well, I guess I just gave him more credit.

The last thing I want to do is narrow myself into something like a human trafficking case, which I haven't prosecuted that much. And the law is gonna be fuzzy to me. And I know that if I'm doing a sex trafficking case, it's going to be contingent upon the victim's testimony, who's not going to be a very credible witness for me, because society's already skewed their name by the fact that there have been a victim. They can always share our contact info with somebody. Really, at the end of the day, we're open to anything that's going to help move the needle on giving people information and keeping them safer. So anything that they can think of I would say, you know, I would I would more champion people to go and try something than to tell them that specific because they might have a great idea. I'd be like, well, this is what you know, Dave said to do it this way. My thing is, I know that it's hard to get human trafficking introduced. It's a scary topic to people. They don't know that much about it. So they shy away from it. When I looked at a fundraiser, I had a credit union tell me they didn't want to sponsor the they're gonna put it out there. went out and drank beer and made out and this seven foot tall hairy covered creature was seen by hundreds of people off and on over the years, but that summer of 1969 Was it was seen by hundreds of people that summer, including law enforcement and people from all walks alive.

And what did that what did that do for you as as a 10 year old? Was it a point of fascination was at a point did it start as a point of fear like almost almost a yo don't don't go near Lake Worth? So that's kind of a young age for something like that to happen just old enough to remember it, but also just old enough to be on the cusp of rumor. And, you know, this was only, you know, 10 days or so before we first landed on the moon and, and yet, the front page story was about this monster, creature, whatever you want to call it, that was seen out at the light. And I did spend a lot of time as a kid out that way. My grandparents had a 26 foot cabin cruiser out on the lake, just up river from from Lake Worth, Eagle Mountain Lakes, it was basically just across the BAM, a dam from Lake Worth. And, you know, we would go out there and anchor out in the middle of the lake and spend the weekend out on the boat. And, you know, I can remember after hearing these stories, you know, thinking about oh my god, of course, a monster is going to come over here from across the dam, you know, so it was a little bit of childhood fear, but it was a whole lot of fascination, you know, with the strange and unknown and unusual. We had the light also smokey Crabtree of Phalke, Arkansas, who was very involved with the movie The legend about you Creek and, and research into the fog monster for many, many, many years after that. And, you know, local researchers and such we had some people that couldn't fly in because of 911 Loren Coleman and Linda Moulton Howe were both to fly in that weekend and weren't able to. But you know, Jefferson has embraced it. We have a Do we have a you know, I guess it could be a life sized statue over six foot tall, a big foot here in town now, many of the most of the restaurants and many of the merchants carry the foot merchandise. Most of the restaurants have a big foot item on the on the menu. So, you know, they've really embraced it. I've been, you know, issued three different proclamations here back in 2005. A proclamation was issued that the third weekend in October and Jefferson is Texas Bigfoot weekend. And in 2016, there was one issued for the 50th anniversary of the first conference and then like we said the the one in 2018 that designated big Jefferson is the Big Foot Capital of Texas so there's there's a lot of stuff here there's big put swamp tours here on Capitol Lake. You know, Jefferson is a cool town where there's lots to see and do antique stores and boutiques as well as you know, by U boat tours and and we even have a drive through Safari. No Bigfoots there yet. Just other regular animals but no, no, no Bigfoot in the draft and Safari as of yet.

Well, and, you know, all joking aside there. Know, that the one thing that I love is it as we were saying these communities have whether it's paranormal ghost hunting or ghost experiencing aliens, cryptozoology, things like that these communities were so dispersed until the internet,

right? And even now, going out and attending these, these shows and going to them and seeing not only the camaraderie, but the community that takes place, and the story swapping that takes place between people, things like that. It is it's like, it's like a, it reminds me a lot of I don't know if you've ever been to rendezvous. But like, when the old friend tears man used to travel across the country to come and throw axes, things like that, you know, tell them tell their bar and stories, things like

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that. Maybe do some maybe do some lumberjack? Yeah, yeah, exactly. What is that the log log?

Yeah, there it is. It is a true culture unto itself and an expression of something and an expression of experience, which, which is what I truly find beautiful. That everybody's experience. Every once in a while. You'll hear somebody calling someone out on something or, you know, oh, that's BS, you know. But aside from that, it is one of the most support. Even my wife when she came to the MUFON conference was like, I don't think and she does a lot of like, comedy conferences, things like that. But she's like, I don't think I have ever been to a conference where everybody is this supportive? Yeah, everybody. And it's true. It's true. It's it's all inclusive, all supportive. Everybody wants to share their story and have and share somebody else's story. You know, right. It really is an interesting slice of culture. And people like you putting on things like the Texas Bigfoot conference, Texas Bigfoot Film Festival, you really are helping facilitate that. What is it that made you want to move from the realm of creating something like crypto moonbow where people could go and share their experience, share their sighting, things like that. Find out about sightings. To move into the realm of I want to I want to put on a live event.

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Well, back in 2000, I attended the Ohio Bigfoot conference a way back when and again, like you mentioned, you know, the camaraderie the networking the fellowship really was made to feel you know, at home and you know, part of a family almost people there so, you know, my my wheels started turning and and you know, I you know said that there's nothing like this going on in Texas, you know, I bet I could do this as and so I you know, started planning. I enjoy hosting An event that people enjoy coming to that can facilitate networking and meeting other enthusiast researchers, investigators, or what have you, and, and have an enjoyable time. And so that's what I started doing and, and along the way have worked with some, you know, some universities and such and museums. Back in 2004, I co curated a, a Bigfoot exhibit at the Brazos Valley Museum of Natural History in Bryan College Station. That was a popular exhibit in 2004. And then 2006 When it opened, but worked on it for probably a year and a half that actually the University of Texas San Antonio, that we put together a 2000 square foot Bigfoot in Texas exhibit at one of their campuses, which is a museum that was open for the 1968 Worlds Fair in San Antonio, I believe. Right now next to the hemisphere tower. Yes. To the Texan Cultures. We my coop co curated this with the with the museum, which like I said, is a campus. So it was you know, the University of Texas, a major university there San Antonio campus, you

know, we put together a 2000 square foot Bigfoot exhibit. And it wasn't, you know, ridiculed or laughed at as a matter of fact, at the end of the, at the end of the exhibit they had where people could, you know, vote on whether they felt that Bigfoot was real or not. And, and the yes votes outnumber the no votes on the, you know, for the length of the exhibit, it was open for nearly six months. And we did several half day conferences, where we brought in people from all over to speak at this thing in 2006 brought Peter Byrne who headed up the slick Yeti expeditions in the 50s. And, and then was here in, in California. With the Sasquatch expeditions in the in the early 60s. Tom slick was an oil man based there in San Antonio and, and his research interest in this institute is still alive and well. There in San Antonio, he was unfortunately killed in a plane crash, I believe in 1962. But his niece had written a biography of Tom slick and, and she was there at the museum with doing a book signing. And, you know, Peter was there to speak about those exciting, you know, times with her Uncle Tom slick, back in the 50s and 60s, you know, looking for strange and unusual creatures, and it was a very, very popular exhibit there in San Antonio. And, you know, that was a really, really cool experience. And you know, to have something that you know, that big on a, you know, a public scale that the general public could, could come to and experience

because it's not like you went out and rented a gallery space somewhere and put it up or put it up in like the back of a coffee shop or something like that. Like, this was at the Natural Science Museum.

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Right. It was a museum, you know, in the one and yeah, the one in Bryan College Station was that the Natural Science Museum and the one in San Antonio was at the University of Texas campus. Yeah, I mean, major university and they believed in it enough to pour the resources in and and to do the exhibit and it was a really cool exhibit. It got a lot of national attention newspapers and such. And, you know, it was very, very popular that it opened in April of oh six and ran through August about I guess it was about about five months or so that it was that it was in you know, in open there at the at the Institute Of Texan culture, that's

Well, you know, my personal thought is that, you know, Bigfoot is a flesh and blood creature it is, in my opinion, a primate. I mean, heck, you know, even humans are primates. You know, it's, I think, a rare and elusive primate that hasn't officially been cataloged by science. You know, there's all kinds of rumors attached to it that, you know, governments, you know, Black Ops have captured them or, you know, have them in their possession. You know, I base things on, you know, what I can see and hear and experience. And as far as, you know, my own experience, I can't explain it away as, as anything else. I mean, you know, and there's only a couple of options, in my opinion, when somebody says that they've seen a Bigfoot, you know, they could be lying. They could have been hoax by somebody else, they could be sure. Under the effects, you know, influence of, you know, drugs or alcohol.

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mistaking mistaking, known wildlife or humans, you know, or, you know, really, to me, there's only one other option, and that is that, you know, they actually saw what they say they saw, and if even one of those people is describing an actual experience that did happen, you know, there's something out there to be investigated. And, and even if I, even if I throw out every one of those hundreds of people I've talked to, I have my own experience that I can't explain away as any of those other options that you know, that it was a horse or a cow or 100, a ghillie suit or burned out tree stump or somebody was hoaxing, or, you know, I certainly wasn't under the influence of alcohol or, or narcotics, you know, I am not lying. I mean, you know, and that's, you know, I can't explain away my own experiences as something other than, you know, what it appeared to be?

What is not is the anecdotal stories that go back hundreds of years. In some cases, 1000s of years. What is not, is the, Let's even say 5% Even if 5% are anomalous, we need to investigate that 5% I just had up on screen an article from Science Magazine. science.org new great ape species found sparking fears for its survival. This was in 2017 We found a new great ape species and, quote, as a human, I'm horrified that we might

not have enough time to save this species directly from the primatologist that found it well, you know, the fact that it's its territory is in threat. And yeah, when you look at something the size of this in America, there's numerous places that are not occupied that are very dense.

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People think that, you know, man has walked across every square inch of North America and that's just not true. I mean, there's the last count I saw in the Pacific Northwest, there were 72 airplanes that had crashed. Yeah. And and they're debris there the remains and not been found and that's a large metallic object stay a stationary object in the you know, the new You know, whatever you want to call it, rain forest or whatever. Yeah, the Pacific Northwest, the redwoods and such. And, and well, you know,

Y'all. This is updated every few years by NOAA. But here's the United States at night. This picture was taken 2012. So it's about 10 years old. That is the most recent one that NASA has up. But if you look, there's literally almost a bold line that goes right down the middle of the United States, almost dividing Texas in half. Where the East Coast is all kinds of lights at night, and the West Coast is almost nothing. That's the developed land. That's major city areas, things like that. So yeah, when you look at that, and you see that, man, that's all undeveloped as of 10 years ago. Yeah. You know, and that's literally almost half the United States. That is undeveloped as far as major city goes. Sure. So yeah, there's there's quite a bit of space, like you're saying, there's 72 planes that are that are still missing.
