Absolutely. I'm excited to have you on because it's number one, I love talking to sociologists. That was one of my courses of study. Yes. In college was sociology with an education concentration. So I was I was wanting to go out and teach and which is I guess a lot of the reason why I do this show. I like to expose people to new thought forms and new ways of thinking. Specifically new ways of looking at the phenomenology of phenomena. Right. Right.

Exactly. And I try to explain to a lot of people like sure, we may get into some conspiracy theory as people would talk it even some tinfoil hat area's, what have you. But the whole reason is to demystify and clarify what is out there and help separate the truth from the myth because they even whenever you're talking about ball lightning, other life forms cryptids, things like that there is a truth in there. Right? Even even if it is the perceived truth of the individual encounters that people have had. Yes, there is a truth in there. So let's, let's begin with how does a sociologist come to studying this kind of esoteric science?

Oh, thanks, Chris. Well, I'll tell you how it started with me. I, I studied fractal geometry, as a type of research method for looking at datasets. And as you know, fractal objects are objects that are mathematically branching, fractured and between dimensions. It's literally the study of non integer dimensional objects. And when you look at a data set that way, you're you're looking at the different you're looking at it differently than you look at it from the ordinary statistical point of view, which is to fit everything to align a regression line. And when I was looking at fractal geometry, and its sister science chaos theory, I realized there were a lot of phenomena that we weren't looking at, even from a sociological point of view. At the time, I was looking purely at the idea of information quality, right? The idea that how do you know anything from your statistics? I'm a former statistics teacher after I got my PhD I ended up teaching statistics for a while you So I know what the limitations of statistics are. And we don't hear about these limitations very much.

We're, we're bombarded with analysis

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that attempts to sway our opinion one way or another every day, especially now, since we're all exposed to social media. But what I learned from fractal geometry is that in reality, it does not fit to align, there is no fundamental metric. It's an imaginary idea that you learned in school that we inherited from Greek science and so forth, going back 1000s of years. But that's not how nature really works. And it started to open my mind to the idea that there could be phenomena between dimensions that don't fit into our ordinary way of thinking and talking about them, but they're still real. So it was from your phenomenological

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approach. Interesting, because a, you know, one of the issues that I used to tell people it literally stymied me for a long time in life was was the fact that my brain thought too fractally I would get caught in literally such a spiral of circular thought and reasoning inside of my own head and branches of possibilities that I would be brought to a point of literal indecision and immobility. I'm sure it wasn't even fight or flight, it was the third the fight flight or freeze, that

whenever it came to it, I would just, yeah. So to think about fractal geometry, and how it even relates to sociology and society as a whole, and, and how, literally, society splinters off and is kind of a fractal in and of itself,

right. The natural order of things is to be fractal, which means you're always going to have subgroups and more subgroups, and things are going to be split off there. They're not always going to be unified. But they're still part of the same tree, even if they're on different branches. But what we should be aware of is the way we were thinking about reality is a distortion from the way it really works. And once I realized that, I began to be open to the idea that there could be things that could be real that I hadn't been taught about in school, that could be between dimensions. Even Edwin Abbott wrote about that, in that satirical book called flatland, written in the 1880s, making fun of Victorian England where he says, he describes a society of beings living on a table atop a two dimensional surface. Right, and they encounter a sphere one day. And they don't know what it is because it looks just like a circle opening and closing on the tabletop because they live on a tabletop surface. And when a square gets arrested for saying that he saw a sphere from severe land, he finally realizes after he's been incarcerated, they tell him that they know that there's been a three dimensional world around them the whole time. But they didn't want to tell the inhabitants of flatland because it could cause social chaos, and that they've known about this other dimension the whole time. So that was just a satirical presentation of 140 years ago. But I think that's actually what's going on. I think we're surrounded by other dimensions of reality that are perfectly described by fractal geometry. But our whole western education is wanting us to make it fit into linear sorts of ordinary shapes. Even you and me, we've been trained to fit into these ordinary shapes. And just looking at electromagnetism, we know it has fractal characteristics. And that's what Ben Benoit Mandelbrot found from analysis of line noise at IBM is that you have these fractal patterns. It's not just in space, it's in time that a year looks like a month looks like a week looks like a second it does in terms of your heart rate pattern. Just looking at the human body, I saw there were all these patterns in there that didn't fit the linear idea that in other words, a real big thing, idea that opened me to all these phenomena that I read about now was that the heart a healthy heart has a lot of variation in it. It's not linear. If it was linear, it wouldn't respond fast enough to external changes in our environment, right? Yeah.



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It would have inherent weak points as well as



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weak points. But all of these systems in nature are super resilient, because that's what you get from millions of years of evolution, and it turned them fractal. And that means that they're very strong, though. They're not always predictable, but they really react. act to variation. And so if that's true of our lungs and our hearts and our brainwaves, they have these fractal characteristics because they're we're all geared to adapt to an ever changing environment where there could be lions and tigers and bears out there. But in the modern era, we've gotten used to lots of linear consistency, even temperatures, buildings that are squarish and we forgot

our fractal roots. But Mandelbrot pointed out that lots of these systems, even electrical and magnetic have these fractal moments about them, which is what makes them work. And people have used that to create fractal compression algorithms and satellites and so forth. So what that means is that there's energy and life between dimensions, which you won't easily detect, but it's there. And you will, just like you said in the intro, you'll see it in the phenomena around us, even though it defies ordinary explanation. But if you know anything about fractals and chaos theory, you know that you should be looking for phenomena that don't fit. Ordinary definition of reality. It's just a little more complex. And so that's what opened me up to these phenomena. I even before I discovered remote viewing in 1996, I thought there have to be things that are real, just like Godel's Incompleteness Theorem, right. And Alan Turing's idea of the Turing Godel idea that any logical system is inherently incomplete. There always are going to be things that are real, that you don't know about from your logical system. You put those ideas together with fractals, and you realize there should be something real. And when I came across remote viewing, I said, This is it. This is what Ghana should have, I'm expecting to have. Well, and it's

That's a type of nonlocality right there. Yeah. Without even the idea of entanglement. It's just that there's these repulsion exclusion principles that mean that the whole system responds to anything happening anywhere in the network. And we have all that already in dark matter, relevant neutrinos, and these kind of fields that were told exist from the cosmic background radiation, which I don't know if this is what explains it, but it certainly is a good idea as anything else is that you already have fields of particles out there. throughout the universe. 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and, and I just popped up on screen right now this is last year's Nobel Prize in physics was the fact of non-local reality and being able to quantum entangled particles at a distance. And being proven this this is a concept that once again, is nothing new. It's been around for a very long time. And been in the world of quantum and theoretical physics, things like that, to have it actively proven and not only proven but double blinded. Bry proven and to the point of here's the biggest prize around for it. It's incredible, and it really does and should open up a whole new world to a scientifically and esoteric Lee period.

No, it's true, Chris, in that's the big mystery. Who why, why aren't we reacting to what quantum mechanics tells us is real. about the nature of nonlocality. And I'm not sure if it's I mean, there is debate and it just happens to me my latest YouTube video which I put up, is it quantum entanglement? Is it more neutrino flux that explains these non local interactions? There's always debate about that. But quantum mechanics did happen 120 years ago, or so. And we're still acting as if it's Newtonian world with these direct linear causation patterns like Newton. Yeah, imagine that everything has a local cause. And we know now that from the work of many physicists from Einstein, from his time around that time, up until now that there's all sorts of other influences going on, that matter, and they don't just matter at the microscopic level, there is mesoscopic effects to have coherency. What is that Bose Einstein condensate? Discovered right here in Boulder, predicted by Einstein and Bose in 1925. But discovered in 1995? I mean, seen for the first time, yeah, which is a quantum coherent, sort of fluid of particles, sure, at absolute zero, but it's still where the particles all overlap and become a big

wave. It's just one particle optic particle. That's sort of a mesoscopic macroscopic effect. And so that's the real thing about it, Chris, if we know that quantum mechanics tells us that these sorts of objects exist in our reality, where particles can become coherent and have all the same frequency, and become just sort of one big wave pattern? Why shouldn't we be surprised that there are all these phenomena around us? That seems strange and weird that we call paranormal? But in fact, are the same analogy as a Bose Einstein condensate to ordinary matter, as ordinary phenomena aren't a paranormal phenomenon? It's the same thing remote viewing ghosts haunted sites, string strange effects around UFOs even around Bigfoot where people's as I discovered study, yeah, topic and where people's watches stop if this was just an escaped gorilla, or a relic primate admittedly rare like people believe why would people's watches have you ever gone to the zoo and your watch stopped while you're by the gorilla? Never had and this is not an ordinary phenomena. I believe the phenomena will just like you're saying the witnesses tell us their battery stopped their cameras. Around UFOs even around remote viewing this happened around Uri Geller. Yep. When Nick how put off and Russell were testing them Russell target Sri Lawrence Livermore Labs they UFOs in the lab they had cryptids. Remember this? It's the hitchhiker effect. It didn't start with Skinwalker Ranch. Yeah, it goes back to Uri Geller in the 70s. Right. Yeah.

And a you know, I've it's interesting, because we have numerous times and I'm very glad to have you on because I've been I've been wanting to get into the topic of Bigfoot and the paranormal, Bigfoot and portals, all kinds of things. It's not like if you go back and look at first person big food accounts from the 60s 70s, things like that, that you that you had an overwhelming number of them like this. There may have been a few. It's true. Yeah, no. This is there's a lot of questions that you're raising which, which anyone who looks into this topic has to consider because and what's the evidence? Well, even groups of friends out hiking once they've seen a Sasquatch, they can't agree sometimes what they saw. Yeah, some people said no, it looked like a cat. And other people say no, it looked like a gorilla. And then the other person says, no, no, I'm absolutely sure it looked like a caveman. Yeah. So what is going on there? Is it? I mean, endless question. Is it affecting our perception? Is it something that's presenting itself a certain way, but we do have hair samples, we do have footprints

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we do we have we have oil samples, we have rocks thrown, finds altars dead. And that's, that's what I'm saying. And they and I'm willing to consider the two as independent phenomena. That that perhaps it's the fact that what is being reported with the portals and other paranormal phenomena is not necessarily Sasquatch as we know it. Well, and traditionally, like, as far as native cultures, discuss it across the globe.

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Yeah, native cultures describe it as some sort of super normal, supernatural human. Because if you listen to Dave Pilates work on Bigfoot, and you know, he has two books on Bigfoot. Yeah, they're both very interesting tribal, Bigfoot, the Hupa project, you know, and these are very evidence based descriptions. But even in these you have strange things happening. I think, as he says in his recent videos that he has on YouTube, it pushed him very early in this investigation, which was funded by some wealthy entrepreneurs from Silicon Valley. It pushed him away from the idea that there was any ordinary explanation for what was going on. And the natives that he talked to the Americans. And same things with First Nations people in Canada, they would all say it's something supernatural about it. And even our own accounts from newspapers. People describe something supernatural. But But that, to me is just, it means that it's just science that we don't really understand yet. I mean, that's my bent as someone from the sciences is that this is physics that we don't understand very well. But it's still happening. I have friends out here in the boulder area who have hiked the Front Range, all the way down to Arizona. And these people told me of extremely strange things that have happened to them. And that's why I wrote Dark Matter monsters is the evidence kept building up. And you're right, Chris, there's more evidence for this. Now more people are coming. Oh, yeah. It's typical of and you've taken sociology classes, there's a name for this. We call it hidden events. This is what you would expect to happen for hidden events, things that people have experienced, but they haven't shared publicly for whatever reason, stigma, ridicule, yes.

Right. And no, no different than it doesn't. And I liken this to straight up real world, folks, and I'll get as real as you can get no different than the increase in the number of reports of pedophilia in the Catholic Church. Now, it's not that it's happening more, or that the numbers are different. It's the fact that more people are comfortable with coming forward. And when more people are comfortable with coming forward, you're going to find out a whole lot more.



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You will and this is the example that sociologist Ron Westrom used at several meetings that I attended the International Society for the Study of it'll come back to me the what the acronym is, at those meetings. ERVA had some joint meetings with them to society for scientific exploration. Excuse me, that's part of SSC, okay, he compared this to child abuse is exactly what you're saying. Yeah, he had looked into this as a sociologist of what did it take for the United States to recognize that child abuse was real? Because before the 1960s, it wasn't considered a real diagnosis. Just like these phenomena.



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We're we're dealing with it right now. Like, Hey, how about Epstein, human trafficking. That's a huge thing that we talk about on their show regularly. Doctors, people do not want to admit that they that is in your backyard. Yeah,



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it's going on. It's the same sort of thing in the sense that people won't talk about it and doctors did not want to accuse Use parents of abusing their kids. Yeah, so the counter explanations kind of like we've heard for UFOs. Like, it's a, it's a weather balloon. It's swamp gas. It's missing identifications of Venus. These were used for child abuse do. They would say that the child had thin bones. The child fell from a tree. Yeah. Or they were, you know, attacked by bullies at school, which which does happen. But that wasn't the whole explanation for the whole phenomena. And yeah, and you see the same sort of intellectual alibis being used for UFOs Bigfoot encounters where the law enforcement will tell people you saw a bear, they've been instructed to say you saw a bear no matter what you saw, right? Bears that were bipedal, that threw rocks at you. I've never encountered a bear that does that. And yet, that's what witnesses are told, they're told us over and over again until they are numb, you know, maybe they'll believe it like pretty he needed an opposable digit for throwing a rock, you do your last time I checked, bears Do not pause, don't work for throwing rocks, they cannot pick up their car. bears do not do this sort of thing. They're very good at climbing, they throw things they don't lift things up. And so so this it's a very good parallel, Chris and I this is what would sociologists would say is, we're not saying that child abuse in UFOs is not the same thing. But it has the same reaction from society. Until you have meetings like it's the our society is going through this right now with UFOs. Yep, it took federal attention and meetings in DC and Chicago, as Western pointed out before the professionals for actually said, This is real P is child abuse is real. It took about till 1965. And a couple really confident individuals who brought law enforcement and and doctors together psychiatrists, and they agreed childcare workers, it took a consensus to fit around data. So this is what's going on with UFOs and UAP. And I imagine will happen with cryptids, eventually to get is we went too far to the extreme to push these topics away, because we didn't want to deal with it. And I think the what it shows us, which should cause alarm to all of us is that the professionals pushed it away. Yeah, the professional scientists will really didn't do their job here. And as they kept saying it was a weather balloon, it's ice crystals, and they will continue. They're happy to keep their positions at these universities while ridiculing the witnesses, which I think is not acceptable.

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And that's the problem. That's not science. And it's it's Not that's all I get. Imagine if we allowed a 2% deviation in architecture.

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to know, if we allowed a 2% deviation of accuracy in architecture, if you had 100% of solution that you were waiting to come out and only 93% came out, you went? Well, okay. Okay.



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No, Chris, this is, you know, the author seem to live who wrote The Black Swan and other books? Yeah, like that. Yes, I have mine and other books about kind of misconceptions and probability and he comes out of the fine financial world. Yeah. Yeah. And his books are all really good. So he points out in these books that the Romans used to make engineers sleep under the bridges they built. Yeah. And the British changed that. In medieval times, the early British Empire. In Britain, they made the, the engineers and their families sleep under the bridge. This is called skin in the gap, which is another one of his books. So this is what we're missing from the whole system is skin in the game? Yeah, precisely missing this, you can just be a BS artist and get away from it. Get away with it. Oh, for like a century of BS until all of a sense of UAP are real. And someone has pointed this out recently that everyone has come out of these classified hearings. They're classified hearings going on right now in Washington, DC about UAP, what we used to call UFOs, which was fine with me, because they look like objects to me. But people coming out of those briefings are senators and Congress people. Chris, they look very somber. They don't look excited. So they're hearing something that is really distressing to them. And they're not telling us, I don't know what it is, and what we're going to find out. It's probably a lot more than that we can control our airspace. Okay. It's a probably a bigger picture of the entire evolution of us, our planet and our species that we weren't told about. And they're hearing the full thing. I mean, they said, Who's ever briefing them and saying, Look, you guys wanted the briefing? Okay, here it is. Here it is. Yeah, we're hybrids. There's other alien species around that are abducting people nightly, we can't do anything about it. There's a hybridization program going on. In fact, humans aren't even a completely natural species. It's something like that. And then they're talking about cryptids, somewhere in the briefing to that, who are these other animal creature life forms are that we've never were told about in our high school biology

class. And that's probably a pretty heavy thing. And this is what you get when you don't have public discussion for a century is that you're just gonna lay it all on you in a couple hours that what should have come over 100 years came in a couple hours? And that's why they're looking somber. Yeah,

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yeah. Well, you know, the a, not a lot of people see things in the windfall aspect like that. And unfortunately, that's the case that most people do not see it either in that way, or in the fractal way that things touch each other, and affect each other. can't answer for the 3% when you're asking me for some money, right? There's that other 3% going on. Why aren't we making money on it?

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Well, you remember the who's Quadrophenia? Yeah. Oh, yeah, yeah, well, this is quanto Freedonia. Yeah, it's, it's like an illness where you have to, it's only the numbers and you keep you keep, you know, twiddling with the numbers. You keep doctoring them until it shows what you want. Because that's where your funding comes from. Do you see where the problem is? Here? Yeah, is once it's all oriented towards funding and publication, people are going to game the system. And what happens after decades of gaming the system is you don't have any idea what reality is anymore. And that's where we're at. Chris, this is where we are right now in this country. It's been gamed for so long by bureaucrats and people that know how to manipulate the system for their own funding needs. 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had zero interest in scientific study, right. There was just gaming

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the system to do what they want you to do, and he wanted his security clearance. By the way, this is very interesting. Little historical footnote. Edward Condon had lost his security clearance. Because of his involvement with quantum mechanics. It was considered to be like pseudoscience. pseudoscience or Soviet tinged science? Yes,

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yeah. It was like Soviet quackery. Yeah, it was different. And

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so he could get even in the 50s. He discovered quantum tunneling. I believe he won a Nobel Did he win a Nobel Prize for quantum tunneling? I believe so. He did. He was a well known freakin physicist, we all have quantum tunneling. It's what makes your electronics and my electronics work. Without quantum tunneling. You don't even have the sun, okay, according to what science tells us. But back in the 50s, it was considered so controversial, just like Einstein's relativity theory, where there's a natural suspicion but we have new ideas, which is not inherently wrong. But in this case, it led to him losing his security clearance. And he wanted

that back so badly. He probably kowtow to the Air Force, which put us in the situation now we're in that we're in where we're shooting down balloons. We've overreacted. So even a party balloon coming over like you're on or whatever. That was the experimental balloon that does experimentalists that it was. Yeah. It's it's a bizarre situation where we don't know what's going on. And we're not looking at what's really in the skies. And we're calling them phenomena, which is almost a step backward. It leads to a general confusion, we have to demand transparency and honesty with this, even if, yes, I could all Einstein. Yeah, he would have loved this conversation. I mean, he was a realist. He wasn't even completely happy with quantum mechanics as it's currently for me. No,
