Well, hello, everybody how you doing this Tuesday night Chris Jordan here coming at you live from Austin, Texas. We've got a heck of a show for you tonight, folks. In our second half. We have Gerard Aartsen. We will be talking about the world of exopolitics a topic that I think if you're not familiar with it, you should really get familiar with it. Like Steven Bassett said from the Disclosure Project just a few weeks ago when he was on the show. He expects a major big D disclosure announcement from the US government by the end of summer. If any of you know Steven Bassett from the Disclosure Project is pretty much the the first person to say like I am a disclosure lobbyists that was back in the mid 90s Whenever he started the Disclosure Project, and it's fantastic to see where it has come and it's fantastic to see the conversations once again, that these topics have opened. But the topic that we need to be concerned about is are we ready as a species? For what that might mean? Are we ready to have political relations possibly with entities from outside of our own planet better whether they be interdimensional interplanetary, what have you. And that even goes to goes to speak to are we are we philosophically ready as a people for things like what we're going to be talking about with our first guest tonight, our good friend, Ken Gerhart, he is the author of monsters in Texas. He is the author of menagerie of mysterious beasts. So so many books that he has authored. We'll be getting to Ken in just a minute. And it's, it's funny to know that even in the world of cryptozoology, there is this overwhelming want this overwhelming want to not only confirm belief, but also for scientific one. And it's interesting to see those things not only play out, but kind of battle against each other sometimes not only within the communities, but scientifically as well to see NASA in their UFO UAP panel. Like I've said, Say what you want about NASA, but the one plus side about their UFO UAP panel was when when they actively called themselves out, and called Science out and was like, it's funny, because like, like the director of arrow is going to tell us there's a three to 5% anomaly of things that we can explain. And I'm pretty sure that's the exact job of science is to figure out things that we can't explained. So, like, there may have been a few fringe scientists, this may have been a science that was on the fringe, but it doesn't mean that it's a non valid science, it doesn't mean that it's a science that shouldn't happen, and a science that we shouldn't be doing, you know, that we shouldn't be actively

looking into. And that's just if we we have to be ready as a species to accept the fact that, you know, hey, maybe we haven't discovered all of the species that are out there. I've got an article up right now that is fairly new. I mean, this July 25. So today, scientists discover new ISO pod species and the Florida Keys. We discover about three 400 species a year. So whenever you hear the concept of well, if it was out there, we'd have found it by now. Not really, man, not so much. Welcome back to the show. Ken Gerhart, how are you doing my friend?

And that means, you know, data driven, of course, and, you know, I think the main thing is just trying to maintain as much objectivity as possible because these are, you know, looking for a nice apart and I guess if you're a zoology nerd like me, then yes, discovering a new Eisah pod searching for it, doing all that research would be pretty cool. And I admire that people that do that kind of stuff. But then when you shift into the realm of cryptozoology, of course, you're dealing with these fantastical creatures like Sasquatch and like monsters and chupacabras and things that people really, you know, there's like a whole nother level of fascination because these are almost like mythological constructs and the possibility that some of these things might be real. You know, that's, that's a pretty mind blowing proposition. So yeah. But yeah, I agree with you, man. New Animal discoveries. Just recently, a weeks ago, there was a new species of snake discovered in Australia, it's like a called a desert with highly venomous like everything. And

we discovered two new koalas, they're both venomous. Yeah.

Pretty, pretty much. It's a beautiful snake. It's like a bluish copper colored. And, you know, it's one of those things, you know, to give you some insight into somehow these, you know, when when a new animal is, quote, unquote, discovered in the scientific realm, it's called described, a

new species is described, there's a paper written, it's usually in a prestigious journal, and then it's peer reviewed. And everyone in that field that specializes in whip snakes looks at the data and says, okay, yeah, but that, you know, this particular species of snake, they kind of knew they were there, they were just mistaking them for another species that's found farther east. So it's kind of more of a, a point where they do like DNA testing, or looking at other characteristics and say, Okay, it's unique enough. And then there's another one that was really cool. Last month, there was a new species of mountain Gecko discovered in Nam. And, you know, that's not surprising, because Vietnam has yielded many new animal discoveries in recent decades. So. So yeah, that's all cool. And it gives hope, I guess that, you know, maybe there are bigger things out there that haven't been discovered that is not impossible. So

Oh, absolutely. And that's just it as if we've had the conversation numerous times as long as there is habitat range and ample food supply. You know, especially whenever you're talking about the the age range of some animals like the article that I sent you about the the huge, eight foot alligator guard that was caught just south of Dallas. Is just massive. And once again, really, really rings that prehistoric aspect to the critter, you know. Interesting how much of the body is actively similar to the coelacanth? Stuff like that?

Yeah, that's the year right. It's a very prehistoric looking fish. After our toss, *Dias Betula* is the Latin name and I actually have a funny story while it's kind of a kind of a cool story. But are you talking about alligator? gars Yes, Texas. You know, one of the states where we regularly people catch 300 pound specimens and the river weighs, you know, the down in the Rio Grande Valley and other found some monsters the Trinity River. Yep. I grew up in Lake Jackson, Texas, which is on the Gulf about an hour south of Houston. And it was very swampy. And me and my friend at the time, I think it was in junior high school had kind of a Stand By Me adventure where we decided to take a boat up oyster Creek, which you know, we'd never done and we'd fished oyster Creek but you know, where's what's up there if we keep you know, kind of moving along the creek and see figure find something cool. And right as we struck off, there was a this was

really weird, but there was like a carcass of a large dog floating in the creek and it looked like like a huge dog like I don't know, like, maybe not a mastiff, but something Pitbull or something. But anyways, something came up and took a bite out of it right as we were motoring past and Oh, wow. And it was an alligator gar. And I you know, of course, I was a kid but it looked like it was easily six or seven feet long, and it kind of rolled in the water. And that was kind of like, you know, seeing something like that when you're a kid. I've had many kind of seminal moments when in my childhood that kind of led me on to the path of cryptozoology, but that was kind of a cool because it almost felt like we were encountering some kind of monster there that was lurking in the creek. So yeah, yeah.

And it's even to speak of monsters lurking in the water. One of the articles I popped up a second ago was another one that came out today, talking about the giant eel theory and the Loch Ness because that is that has been one of the larger going theories as of late for the Loch Ness Monster, as you know, there are freshwater eels there perhaps it's like a nice 1012 foot eel, something like that, where you could see a few undulations at the same time. But apparently they have run DNA, all kinds of things. And that is that is not the case.

Hmm, well, yeah, this article was interesting. I think, yeah, you make a good point. First of all, we know that there are there are eels in Loch Ness plentiful eels? That that was proven by the DNA study in 2018 and 19. By Dr. Neil gamble. Yeah. And that was at that time, they kind of came out and made that broad pronouncement that oh, the Loch Ness Monster might be a giant eel because we have all this eel DNA. Even though DNA doesn't tell you how big an animal it is. It just tells you there's a little

Here's the thing, I have some conservatives more some of the more conservative cryptozoologists like Richard Freeman from England, and some of those guys that have spent time at Lochness. They embrace this giant eel theory, because it seems a little bit more pragmatic than something like a PCSO or, you know, ancient, prehistoric beast. But there's no evidence. I mean, the largest congressos and Loch Ness, I think get to be about five feet long. And those are rare. I mean, most of them are about three feet or even smaller. So and as far as that species worldwide, the Congress still can get to be like seven feet long and brackish waters in the ocean. And then you have species of marine eels, like the Moray eel that I guess can get to be 10 to feet 10 feet long, but there's not a lot of evidence for there's no evidence that Congress can reach the proportions that people describe when they see the Loch Ness Monster, they their estimations are usually like 1015 2040 feet long, you know, as far as far as what they're seeing above the surface. And it's a pretty big jump, you know, to speculate, and

to me, it's just as fabulous to speculate. Okay, well, there's a Congri Oh, but it's, you know, 10 times bigger than any country that's ever been found. Yeah, I mean, you know, Dr. Royle met Roy maca, who was a really bright cryptozoologist, back in the day, talked about these unic eels, which are eels that lose their sex drive, and they just kind of stay on the bottom of the lake and get, you know, who knows how big they get if they're staying close to the bottom, but I don't know, I think creating a new species is, you know, just as kind of tumultuous is proposing that there's some prehistoric animal that's still alive in there. So Whoa, well,

When I come I do a lot of these forums because but this is just and this is based on the researchers that have more boots on the ground. They're like Steve Feltham, and Roland Watson and some of those guys. But there's particular gentleman that filmed this, and I can't even pronounce his name Chris. He's Irish. And he's got a whole bunch of vowels in his first name and a whole bunch of consonants in his last name, but he's been doing this now for a few years where he's got these. He watches the live streams of Loch Ness, there are cameras, stationary cameras set up around the lock, that people can get onto various websites and kind of monitor the lake. See if they see something and he's been spending a lot of time doing this in recent years, and has come up with just a number of videos that are what many researchers

think are just like, normal things on Loch Ness like waterbird swimming around. Yes, there are supposedly otters in Loch Ness there are occasionally seals that come into Loch Ness. So I mean, there's a lot of things debris actually can look kind of animated when it's moving against the current which can happen in Loch Ness things can move against the current stuff so so yeah, and wave effects so this particular guy seems like he's he's really making the most of his opportunities and doing what a lot of people are doing on social media now and he's just trying to get as many views and hits and you know, clicks as possible so it doesn't make sense that one individual would have had this many observations of the Loch Ness Monster when you have a lot of other researchers that are spending equal amounts of time or a lot of time trying to photograph things so so I'm a little skeptical about these particular videos that one of the shows that I'm on currently on the History Channel is called the proof is out there nights at nine o'clock Yeah, and I think a couple of weeks ago they had a video on there that was fairly recent from Loch Ness that I thought looked pretty good I mean, it was actually you can see more of the form of a large back or what appeared to be a back kind of swimming through the water surging, creating a lot of displacement there and so yeah, there have been some compelling films from Lochness to the years no doubt, the Dinsdale footage the Gordon Holmes footage some of those so so yeah, I mean, it's kind of a mixed bag right but you know, definitely endorsed the the reality of something there in the lake. That's, that's unknown.

So we're actually the overlooked line of evidence of a lot of these lake monster cases, we do have several good sonar contacts from Loch Ness dating back to 1954. Yep. And from Lake Champlain, Katie, Elizabeth researcher up there, as has had some compelling contacts. I certainly don't pretend to be a sonar expert, Chris. It's a very complicated technology. The basics, which most people probably understand are that you're bouncing sound waves through the water, and they're reflecting off things and coming back, and then you're kind of analyzing those, those echoes. But from what I understand, and there are different levels of sonar in terms of, you know, quality and features and things, but a sonar contact is not always an exact representation of the shape of something, particularly if that object is moving. Yeah, cuz it's taking a certain amount of time to kind of, you know, for those echoes to reflect and for everything to be analyzed. And so what are the main things you can tell us roughly how big something is? Or if

it's larger, if it's just a fish or a school of fish or something, you know, that, like, this is kind of like him? I don't know if that is a school of fish. I mean, certainly. It looks like it has appendages of some kind. If

But, you know, my answer is that, you know, audio recordings, unfortunately, are kind of in the same category as alleged videos and photos and things that they're, you know, just highly open to interpretation. And just never, potentially could never be conclusive evidence that you can take into an academic situation and say, but look, look, look, I mean, that photo is and listen to this, I mean, they're not gonna you know, it's it's a physical evidence is really the, the crown jewel of this type of research DNA, or bones or teeth. I think it adds to the evidence, and I think people should continue to record audio and try to get photographic evidence. But I don't know if it's pragmatic to spend a ton of resources in that area, I mean, look big for researchers are typically broke. Like, and don't have a lot of resources, and they're spending as much time as they can out there. And it's just a matter of just like, any industry or in Chris, it's about, you know, resourcing, putting resources into your best, whatever it is your best chance of accomplishing a goal or doing something. So I think I think the emphasis should really still be on DNA collection and searching for remains. Because I mean, if these animals exist, they're huge. There has to be a breeding population. They're gonna leave bones and teeth and things. They gotta you know, yeah, I don't know. I'll get off my soapbox.

Just recently, I had the great pleasure of going behind the scenes in our avionics department, the bird specialists, and we're one of the top bird zoos in the country. And I actually spoke to the Jozsef, who's the head, been there for like 40 years, and we talked about the ivory billed woodpecker, if you're familiar with campy fileless principal Bayless, the bird supposedly went extinct in the 30s or 40s. But there have been pretty aggressive searches in recent decades, including Cornell University. There are anthology lab and other universities, there have been alleged sightings and videos and things. I'm currently corresponding with a researcher in Louisiana who thinks he's seen them. But Joseph brought up a great point, which was because he's a he's a bird breeding phenom. That's what we do at the San Antonio Zoo is we read highly endangered birds Macaronesian King fishers, we helped save the whooping crane from extinction. I mean, and what he talked about is, you know, pretty obvious, but I never really considered genetic bottlenecking, which, you know, once you get down to a certain number of individuals in any species, and there isn't enough genetic diversity among those individuals, that that's really creating a lot of problems for their offspring, because their offspring are more likely to have, you know, genetic conditions, immunity problems, absolutely. Things like that. So I mean, if any of these animals are that incredibly rare, which, you know, I've always kind of thought about that, you know, it's like, well, maybe these things, maybe we can't find them, because there's only just a small number of them left, whatever that small number is. That's a another discussion. But, you know, with regard to Sasquatch is I think there are a few 1000 across North America, which I still think makes them incredibly rare. Oh, absolutely. But I guess, you know, that's the minimum number that it would take to avoid that type of genetic bottleneck to where they're just dying off and going extinct. So

yeah. And that there are many prime examples of that genetic bottleneck. I mean, whenever you whenever you start a prime, a really good example is dog species, dog breeds rather, because there's just the species of dog. Every single dog that's out there at every breed of dog that's out there has been made by man, and cold from Wolf, all the way down to a rat terrier, for exactly what they're made for. Now, the issue is some of those breeds like English bulldogs, because of their characteristics, things like that were bred that way and bred into a point of actively having health issues because of because of the way that we wanted them to look. And now it's the fact that generations down the line. Same thing with Dalmatians, they were bred because of their incredible hearing, and eyesight. And specifically bred for life saving purposes, things like that. But the lack of crossbreeding started making a great number of them deaf, partially blind, things like that. And that is that's a big thing. Whenever you go out to buy a Dalmatian, if that's what you're looking for, you need to make sure that you aren't getting one that is of that genetic inbred stock. Because eventually without like you're saying without the genetic crossbreeding going on between things. Yeah. Things get weakened.

And, you know, another example of that at the zoo is that, you know, we'll swap you know, we we have affiliations with the ACA and other organizations where we actively swap animals around the country so that, you know, if one pair of Jaguars has cubs, we don't want them to have that same couple that have too many cubs. So we'll switch our male with another male or whatever to create that genetic diversity because that is important to have a healthy lineage. Speaking of dogs, is that a good segue? I don't absolutely. Okay. Absolutely. Not. Maybe not dogs so much. Oh, yeah. There you go. I saw a couple of those guys. Were trying to breed a pair of those right now. It's pretty cool. I actually got to handle a Guam rail, which is one of the rarest birds in the world and still extinct, extinct in the on the island of Guam. So that was pretty cool. Just for a minute. So anyways, yeah, speaking of dog while speaking of dog, man, if anyone's interested. We're organizing a conference, of course, Labor Day weekend. It's going to be in white settlement, Texas, just in the it's actually a suburb of Fort Worth, or probably within Fort Worth proper, and it's actually very close to Lake Worth. Grier Island, home of the Lake Worth monster, the Lake Worth goat, man. So we're about 10 miles south of there. If anybody comes to the conference, they might want to go explore Grier Island and look for the Goat Man but yeah, there you go. There's the speakers. Two days.

Now you were being fully assumptive as to what the gorilla is doing and why the gorilla is doing it instead of just observing the gorilla. And I think that we as a humanity, yeah, we we tend to think that because we as a humanity, strive to be a utopian society air quotes there, folks. Because we strive for that, we assume the fact that every interstellar civilization that would be able to travel amongst the stars would be that



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there I disagree there I would disagree with you, okay. Because, as I said, you know, system science finds that evolution and I found this in the books, summarized by Professor Ervin Laszlo consciousness evolves towards ever greater unity.
