He is the founder of radical empathy Education Foundation, he has been working in the world of VR empathy building for years and years, specifically, targeting the world of abuse, the world of human trafficking to begin with, but now you're applying this technology and these techniques that you've learned to abuse situations of all kinds and being able to help people everywhere help identify and empathize with those who are abused. Yeah, that's right. Thanks so much. We man Chris, how long has it been? Eight years? 725 years since we've known each other? Yeah, we've been working on a year and a half into dudes and beer.

Wow. There's something like that. It was within the first year of dudes and beer that I found you at classic game fest, right? You were set up and it was it was a setup. It was with HTC Vive and the crazy stuff. Yeah, yeah, it's, uh, we we started way back then. And we were obviously working on human trafficking to get people to understand it. And since since then, we have been going out and we've educated over 10,000 people across the United States. We have licensees and 10. States. We are Yeah, we're super excited about that. Thank you so much. We've we have made, we've made differences in so many people's lives. And people have come and they've told us about it. And the in the bottom line is that what we find what we're finding is that our software helps people understand abuse, and they understood it helps people understand the victim and Predator mentality. And so we're trying to take that and expand it. So some of the people that use our software, we have middle schools and high schools. And we're finding that those that those users what they're doing with it is they are using this software with their counselors and their students. And so when the students put the headsets on, it talks a lot about abuse, it talks about family violence, talks about abandonment, it talks about not getting enough attention from your parents talks about how difficult it is, you know, to basically be a teenager, and what the counselors like about the software is that it's very real. And

it mimics real life and real life stories and things that people can identify with. And it helps those kids actually trust that those adults are going to get them some help. Well, and that's really a big part of it is that trust, especially when you're a teenager, knowing i for i was very, very fortunate, like I was telling you earlier, I'm out doing things from my high school right now. I came from a very lucky High School in the fact that we had teachers that cared. We had a community that cared. You know, we had very, very involved parents we had, it was it was fantastic. It really was and it was amazing. But not every school district is like that. Not every school is like that. No, not every school has the Invoke parents that they used to 25 years ago. That's one of the things that was so surprising about this particular school. They're in Arkansas that these are software. The principal, he said had been he'd been a principal there for 27 years. And one of the challenges that they have is that he said that unfortunately, a lot of the parents are just not good role models. And so he is he is he's in a place where the parents of these children that are his students, they don't know how to teach kids the difference between right and wrong. And so they're using our software as a place for those kids to kind of kind of take their temperature and when the kid takes the headset off then they can actually have a real conversation. Yeah kind of stuff with them about Yeah, the cific example of real realistic kids situation that they can discuss as a group and just cross section they're like not many people are aware of Little Rock Arkansas quite literally one of the gang capitals of the United States. Wow. When it when it comes to like street gang, things like that. They are

And yeah, this is an endemic problem all over the country where, unfortunately, and sure a lot of it is even eco diversified by the fact that you know, many times that, hey, you're dealing with a lot more single parent homes, and you're used to be, you're dealing with a lot more two parent working homes that you're used to, that you didn't used to. And that's what's going on across the country, we are now in a situation where both parents have to work so that you can survive. I mean, you've seen the numbers low in and seeing those things, seeing those small cues. And what we'll say let's start getting into because this is this is what's important with with really, any abuse situation is the idea of grooming, the idea of getting somebody uses the idea of getting somebody used to the abuse being the norm. That's right. You know, grooming can be like you said it could be it could be about abuse. Normally, when people are talking about grooming, what they're really talking about is they want to normalize the conversation and normalize discussing six. And having that become normal weather, whether you're talking about whether they're trying to talk you into sending a nude picture of yourself, or if they're trying to talk you into looking at pornography, or if they are, if they're physically in your space and touching you and things like that. They want to normalize all of that stuff. And this is one of the things that the principal was telling me that a lot of these children do not understand that there are supposed to be personal boundaries, that they're that people are crossing those boundaries constantly. One, one example he gave me as he had a young girl who had just gotten her GED, and she wanted to get a hug. So she comes running, she comes into it. And she's like, you know, oh, I want to I want to get a hug. And he's like, when I can't give you a hug because I am in a position of power this fall, I'm gonna show you how a hug works. We'll get we'll sit down on a chair. So we sat down, they sat on a bench and he gave her like a side hug. And two weeks later, she came in and she turned in some frame her family members for sexually abused sexually assaulting her. Because that one moment where he showed respect for her body boundaries, showed her that she needed to have body boundaries. That's right at 17 years old, and that other things that were occurring in her life. That's right. We're normal. We're not. That's right. She would not have been she did not know what normal was. That's right. That's right. And that's what and that's one of the things we're really trying to push right now. We're trying to get people to understand that they're that they have body boundaries they need, we need to get them to understand their names or their body parts. Because that's another issue with children, if they don't know the name of their body parts. That is a separate body part that that is theirs. And nobody's supposed to be touching it. If they don't understand that's not part of their leg or their lap. It's like there's a there's a whole lot of stuff that's very basic, you know, that you and I grew up with?

Don't be ashamed if something wrong happened. Or don't be afraid to come tell

Me, I have a theory or something like that happened because the earlier you can institute that, the better off you're going to be down the line, you're building a barrier of trust where there is nothing that will diminish my love for you, there is no kind of trouble you can get in. That's right, make me think less. That's right. Unconditional love lasts forever, no matter what. Right? You're creating a beautiful barrier of trust to let that kid win something, you've earned that and you've been working on that for seven years. That's it. That's it, you have to nurture it, you're trained nurturing it, Jackie and I. So we have two kids are now 25 and 2024 25. And which is also unbelievable. But we spent a lot of time with those kids, teaching them that

whatever they had to tell us is totally okay, there's nothing wrong with that, if they break something or something went wrong, they need to tell us what we what we told them was like, if you break something, just tell us you're never going to be in trouble for breaking something. But if you don't tell us and we go in there, and we touch it, and it falls to pieces, we're probably gonna be pretty upset. Like I would rather you tell me that we broke, you broke the whatever. And so the kids would always had that relationship with us, which is why we wound up finding out that this that grooming had hit us, like my boss, I was working on a project and this guy was calling the house on the landline, not even on a cell phone that he would call the house

and he would sometimes the kids would answer and so he would talk to them. He had known him for years. And then one day he's talking to them about how to clean their, you know, body parts. How what pornography sites are supposed to look at? And they asked us you're like, why is he telling us these things. And it was at that moment that we realized that all of the work that we had spent in being open with our children and talking to them about this stuff and telling them it's okay, and they can always talk to us about everything, and we're never gonna get them in trouble for what they say it paid off. And I have found that there are very few children that have that kind of relationship with their parents. And it's a lot of work I did to be a parent is to really be active is very, very complicated and difficult. I did youth ministry for about 10 years of my life and worked everything from age four, all the way to age 40. I taught adults things like that, too. But for 10 years of my life, I saw kids grow through that phase through the age of four to 14. You know, I saw their older brothers and sisters come and go things like that. So it's interesting to an even as a teacher in a school where you have generational families coming through, it's interesting to see that arc and see how those things change. Over time, even his parents and even right now, me and a buddy of mine are having the phone call or having the conversation on the way home yesterday about screen time.

So that's something that we talked about a long time ago, and I need to get him back on the show are Sean McCluskey helps head up the UT center for identity. He is a former secret service agent, we used to regularly have the conversation. He is the reason why I do not put my son's name with a picture of my son on social media. Oh, man, I got a video. Because otherwise, I would be tying his name to his biometric data. And I'm already without his consent, giving his biometric data away to a system without his consent. How many emancipation cases will we start seeing in 10 years, because parents have given away their biometric data of their kid, there's return years. So there's a term for it now. It's called Sharon Ting.

So the idea is, if you can find I'll send you a link to a YouTube video that was really good. They took this kid, they took some pictures that these this family had put up online, and they made and they animated it, they aged the daughter, they aged her and then they put a voice on it. And basically had their daughter at mid 20s talking to this couple that go into the movie theater. So they go to the movie theater, and they're like, Oh, we're gonna do this and their families like what is going on? So it's like, they knew well, they know everything. So if you if you talk about your kid and your dog and this kind of stuff, then they can go reach out to your kid and they're like, Oh, I've got your puppy. I need you to come down to the street corner to come get it and it's like, your kid is gonna go run right out. Yeah, the stuff that the stuff that can

Yeah. And he said to call you That's right. And so luckily Grandma called the another uncle and the uncle said no, we put the kibosh on that. Yeah, it with the amount of the amount of what does it call the voice cloning that they have now with AI with? Much you don't need much at all, I think it's three seconds of somebody's audio and it sounds close enough that you could that you could fake it. And so, you know, with a family, you need to have like your safe words. You know, if I say banana, you need to say pineapple. Yeah, it's like there's some serious stuff that we need to be worried about. Well being concerned about. That's right. And I quite literally make people pass tests, there is a guest that I was literally talking to another guest about because they were the ones who hooked this up. And this guest hadn't been on social media in a long time. And I was like, Hey, man, have you heard from him? Like I've tried reaching out I've tried texting I know he's not on social media. Like he was taking a break for a long time. But I was just wanting to catch up maybe have him on the show. You know, see how he's doing. See another model rockets are going stuff like that.

Oh, yeah, my nonprofit with everything that I'm doing in my life. It's like if I lost my Facebook accounts for some weird reason. I mean, it would, it would mess me up. If I lost my Google accounts that would mess me up seriously, I have to be very cautious about what I post online. Not and not just because of the general concern that I have about hacking, but I'm concerned that if I post something that's going to upset the censors that they will take away my Google account or take away my Facebook account that will that will lock me out of so much stuff. It's all very scary. And so it's like a big house of cards. That if I wind up like like anybody can do at 430 in the morning, like that one link or, or if you get a text message on your phone, there's that SMS with that real weird link and it just happened that you accidentally clicked it as it popped up on your screen.

That's right, you know, and admit that they had done that stuff. You don't want to just sit there and laugh at him? Because I mean, that's their moral safety and financial safety. Yeah, it's their financial livelihood, they may not be able to find a lot of parents are living on fixed incomes now. So and let's start getting into the technology narrow, stupidly, and how how, what started off as track a VR detective story, which was all about human trafficking, the the trail that goes down that how to spot a victim of that, how to recognize that you're being that you're being triggered being trapped. That's right. You're being coerced into That's right. Because and that that's something that we kind of need to touch on real quick, because a lot of people don't understand that. There's a legal definition difference between human trafficking human smuggling, and that is, yeah, version. Yeah, let me get the bottle quick. So the so there's, there are three. So human trafficking has three requirements, you have to there has to be an action, a means and a purpose. And that is very vague, it's an inaction basically means that you're in

control of a person, like you're going to take them somewhere you're going to make them do or you're going, you're going to have them do something. So that's an action. The means is how you get them to do that whether and that's usually broken down into force, fraud, and coercion. So force, like, Okay, I'm going to hit you or I do hit you. That's easy. Fraud. I've tricked you into doing this. And then coercion is the thing that no one really understands what it is. So when and then the third part, the third part of action means that purpose and the purpose is for commercial exploitation. So somebody's making money by having you do something against your will. And human trafficking. It's either labor, which is you know, you're doing something with your with your body or work, or if it's six, which is also labor. So human trafficking is basically forcing somebody to do something they don't want to do, and you or somebody else is making money off of it. And so that's what that's what human trafficking is. But so I've taken hundreds of courses on human trafficking, I've been to webinars I've talked to, I've talked to experts, I've been in group sessions, I've been to conferences, and the coercion and psychological manipulation that is really behind human trafficking, the thing where somebody has something on you, they're emotionally blackmailing you or actually blackmailing you to do things, it's something that is almost never really understood by an audience. So like, I watch classrooms, where it's one trainer in front of 30 students, and those students do not really understand emotional blackmail, or coercion or psychological manipulation, they just don't get it. So the reason that we built this VR experience was to put you in the shoes of a young girl who becomes psychologically manipulated by a professional predator that she meets, or that finds her online. So we built this simulation to put people in a victim's shoes so they can understand how it feels, and a lot of what you got on screen, it's awesome, because we simplified this experience as best we could to make it so that anyone would be able to access this. So you literally just look around with that little red dot moving your head. And then as you encounter objects that are just little

yellow cubes or yellow circles on the ground, then you interact with the world like that. So we're showing that this is something that can happen to anybody where you think you think the world is a nice place and all that stuff, and certainly is. And this very first part is, is really, it's the first time first time a lot of people have ever used virtual reality. So we put you outside you can see the trees blowing around and stuff like that. And the idea is basically to kind of give you a chance to get into the environment. Yeah, and still feel like it's all outdoors and free and freedom and it's bright and the music is really pretty and everything.

We've watched, we've watched teachers use AR AR VR software alongside their PowerPoint presentation, so I watched it at the University of North Texas Health Science Center watched a roomful of 70 medical students all be taught for 45 Min.

It's off a PowerPoint. And we talked about, or the teacher, Dr. Fellini, she talked about this is happening in America is happening to everybody. It's happening in every community that you can imagine. And it happens through this reason. And that reason, the other reason. And so the students are all diligently taking notes, they find they, they finish, they finished the class, it's 45 minutes of PowerPoint, she had a couple of videos all look good. And then she goes, Hey, we're going to let you guys use our VR software. And so the kids put the students that the headset on, they all go through the 20 minute experience, they take the headset off, and they mobbed her like she was Mick Jagger, because they finally put the pieces together got happening in America they can, you can be tricked by no fault of your own, just because you want some attention, and some affection. So this young girl in the story, she actually meets what she believes is young boy online, and he's paying attention to her mom's not paying attention, parents are divorced moms working too many hours, she's mad at her daughter, but she can go online. And every time she goes online,

this this boy, quote unquote, is there and he's listening to what she has to say he'll pay attention to her. And that getting that attention is the thing that the younger really wants. And everybody wants attention and affection. Everybody wants somebody to listen, because part of the part of the empirical needs pyramid it is we've got to have love and attention and physical touch. That's right. That's why shunning is so powerful. Right away love and affection. It's real. And people will go back, I'll do anything to be back at a dry erase. Yeah, yeah. So this. So this experience actually provides people the insight of how the psychological manipulation forms, how it can form, and how it can be used to trick you into doing things. And that's really all human trafficking is where somebody has tricked you, or convince you to do something against your will. And they make money off of it. Yeah. And that's, and that's the thing, because you can be in an unhealthy relationship with your partner, or your parents or anybody. And they don't have to be making money off of it. But they could still be abusing you psychologically, they could still be sexually abusing you, they're sort of taking advantage of you. But it took two years for that to go to trial, and for this person to wind up getting prosecuted and wanting to go into jail. And one of the things that was a constant problem was that the people that would become attached to the case, whether it was a attorney, whether it was the police or whatever they would they would actually verbalize it was like, why don't you just why don't they just leave? Why don't they just leave? Why don't they just leave? And it's like, and that was it was so obvious that that mindset is so pervasive, yeah. Or the lack of understanding of trauma, bonding, emotional blackmail, Stockholm Syndrome is so pervasive that we have failed our society if we are not teaching people how that works in India, you know, kind of to that example, like when my wife Amy gotten her accident this time last year, okay.

They're just not, what they do is they wind up and they stand in front of a roomful of people that don't believe them. And then they have to convince them that their experience was real. Yeah. And they become injured by trauma, they become re traumatized by being in a room full of people. And so what our software has done is it allows you to scale to every person to give them a completely unique, personalized experience. So they can be trained immediately, in 20 minutes, you will understand how this works. And no one gets hurt. The trainer does not get re traumatized. In fact, one of the things that we the feedback that we get from our trainers is that they have lived experience. And if they've been training for a long time, there, they go in there. What, what, what shelters do you think that they're going to? I mean, like, there are not enough shelters right now, for people there. There's not enough for boys. There's a there's a group, I don't want to give all the names or whatever.
