We're not taught about in school, but groups like MUFON is very instrumental in collecting this information. And you just don't really get that kind of information, not even at other UFO conferences. So that's what I really appreciate about the MUFON group is they are actively out there, collecting this information, people out in the field, checking out the stories, finding out what's real, putting it into a database, and then that database is really incredible for doing other kind of presentations. For example, on Saturday night, somebody took all of the MUFON studies about portals opening up. That was really fascinating. I never thought about how many witnesses have seen portals. So yeah, that's cool about that group is they do have so much information and studies and sightings in their database for people to pull from.

And as far as underwater artifacts at Antarctica, one of the best known is the eltonen antenna, which is discovered quite by accident, right underneath the very deep water between the southern tip of South America and the Palmer Peninsula. And indeed, that's the route that I took via sailboat five and a half years ago down to the Palmer Peninsula. So it could be an ET antenna. Could be the Nazis put it in for their submarine fleet going down there. Or it could be the US or another government military putting this antenna down there, but it's quite clearly fashioned by a higher intelligence, just as are these megalists around the world, clearly a worldwide phenomenon of a build a race, as you mentioned, that created These megalithic structures with polygonal architecture, that means multi angles, and then fitted together very precisely into these megalithic structures that still exist today, and some of them are very, very old. And

let's start getting into some of those examples real quick, Brad, of that construction technique that you're talking about.

Sure, sure, I do a whole presentation on the Builder Race and megaliths around the world, and I draw from hundreds of slides that show these constructions worldwide. And the thing that really brings them all together is this similar style of construction, this polygonal architecture. So let's start in South America. And you have the city of Cusco in Peru, which is at 11,120 feet in elevation. First of all, it's way up there, pretty much at the top of most of our mountains in North America, at least out west here. So the elevation is just incredible. Then you go up above Cusco, which is totally chock full of these megalithic Builder Race constructions, and you have this site called saksewaman, truly one of the most mysterious sites of the world. You ever have the opportunity to go to Peru, you would certainly be making your way up to saksewa, and it's right up there with Machu Picchu and Oye totambo, other sites that have this incredible megalithic. Rock work that is so evident when you tour these sites. We're talking about 20, 3050, ton blocks with this absolute, precise fitting this configuration. I'm glad you pulled up that picture, Chris, you can see what is known as the marshmallowing technique, yeah. And also, on the look at the block on the lower right there, it's like you can see the trowel mark. So it's like they they soften these stones to the point that they were malleable and could fit them when they're wet, yeah, almost like cement. Well, it's

interesting, because when you start getting into that, and even even the concept Brad of perhaps they had some kind of geopolymer technology that they used, something like that, and

even the idea of this construction technique itself being akin to corn, which which was held sacred by most native tribes in the Americas, you know, it was not only a staple crop, but a sign of their gods. So the idea that this, this whole construction technique, is kind of based on the same geometric polymer construction of ear of corn is interesting to me. You know that they, they lean directly on nature around them to pull that from

that's a good point. And they also use different color stones to recreate images of animals, and you do see quite frequently, images of the snake of the water, the Puma of the land, and the Condor, bird of the sky, and they will create megalithic stones that fit right into the walls of a different color, clearly depicting these animals of air, earth and water. So again, it's just such a mystery, not only how they were built, how they were moved to the site, how they were fitted together so expertly, but also how old they are. And indeed, in Cuzco and many other locations of South America, the Incas were reported to have told the Spaniards we found the foundations of these megalithic buildings and we just built upon them, yeah. And indeed, you can see the Incan architecture and the Spanish architecture, sometimes all three in one building. And it's quite clear that the the oldest, the megalithic, is the best built. And they do get hit by a lot of earthquakes down there, so a lot of those, especially the Spanish mortar built buildings will come crumbling down. And there's an example of Incan, not so precise, fitted stone without mortar, with megalithic, uh, older stones all around it and underneath it.

And you know, to see the fact that, yes, these things are fitted without mortar. They're massive in size, and, once again, seem to have an appearance, because it's not like they've been worked in a standard fashion. You don't really see tool marks, chisel marks, things like that. It looks as though they have been extruded from a form it's it's really fascinating to look at.

I had the great opportunity of going down there with Nassim Harriman, who's, uh, a new physicist with new new ideas about these constructions, among other subjects that he covers, as well as Brian Forrester, who's a total expert on these sites. And they were talking about a building technique called Cold Plasma, where they would render these stones not quite liquid or clay form, but almost solid, but malleable enough to use this cold plasma technique to mold them into place. And you mentioned also that they could be poured concrete. There's some evidence of some of the stones at Puma Punku that shows signs that they're poured concrete. But in all cases, we're talking about technology that it really is has either been lost to us or is now being suppressed, and we're not getting the full answer as to how they were able to do this. And yeah, not that, but also auditive levitation. They might have been able to move these massive blocks by matching the resonant frequency and moving them over into place. And

I will, I will definitely say, I appear on a lot of shows talking about binaural beat frequency, just the science of frequency and the way that our body resonates with frequency and responds to

So an example I often give when I talk about auditive levitation is consider how an opera singer can shatter a wine glass with her voice, nothing more. Every piece of matter is as well if you can match that resonant frequency, the Tibetans showed how acoustic levitation works. They had a Swedish scientist out there. I profiled this story in my book, future esoteric in the Forbidden sciences chapter, that they were able to move these giant blocks of stone up a high ledge on the mountains just by using musical instruments in their voice chanting in a semi circle around the stone. And when their their voice and musical instruments culminated to a certain climax, the boulder would start shaking, and then they would all lift their heads up right when the boulder started levitating, and then they would astrally project the stone up the cliff face, then with their their minds too. And indeed, for example, all along the Nile river there are other pyramids, especially up near the Great Pyramid Saqqara. Some of them are newer pyramids, and they're literally just piles of rubble. And here you can see at saksewamen, the Incan building clearly inferior to the megalithic building. So usually you would think that history would work the other way around, that you would start in a very archaic. Way of building and then reached the pinnacle later on. Quite opposite here, well,

Yeah, back to the Coral Castle, the little guy, Ed Lee scalian, who built it, yeah, all he said was he knew the secrets of how they built the Great Pyramids, and that he was modeling his building technique, probably employing auditive levitation. But did you know that the Coral Castle is the only megalithic structure of the 20th century, built by this guy, single handedly, really, oftentimes in the middle of the night. Yep, the only one

And there you can also see megalithic foundations Incan blocks, and then sometimes Spanish colonial on top of that, those are very susceptible to earthquakes. Whenever there is an earthquake and it's right on the ring of fire, so you get a lot of really severe earthquakes. One of the biggest in the world was right along the Humboldt trench South America. And other buildings come crumbling down. But these megaliths part of the ingenuity of the design and construction is they can withstand these great big earthquakes too. Yeah,

And they fit together so that instead of being one solid column that cracked whenever the vibration happened, that they could shift and move and the building wouldn't fall over. You know, absolutely phenomenal, ingenious to to see that that they built shock absorbers into their buildings. We didn't. We didn't figure that out until the 50s, you know,

And once again, there have been hypotheses for quite a while now about possible structures in Antarctica, like you, like you mentioned a minute ago, the very large, what appears to be pyramid in Antarctica, the the antenna in Antarctica, things like that. Let's, let's start going through a few of those in our last few minutes. Brett Sure,

yeah, and the one that's been featured on Ancient Aliens, and most people have seen the perfect four sided pyramid poking through the ice that's in the Ellsworth mountain range in West Antarctica. I know where it's at. Fact, I was talking to a group, an outfitter that can fly pretty much anywhere with a budget, and I was showing them all my pictures, and they were giving me an evaluation what they knew about it, and it showed them the pyramids in the Ellsworth range. And they said, well, they just dismissed it as a Nun Attack, which is just an attractive mountain under the ice. And I said, Oh, that's interesting. Why do you think that? He said, Well, we fly over it on our way from Union glacier to Vincent Massif, which is the tallest mountain in Antarctica, where a lot of people who have already climbed the tallest peaks on other continents want to round it out and do all seven continents, right? I said, Well, you call it a Nun Attack. You dismiss it as being intelligently fashioned. But have you stopped there? Have you climbed it? Have you taken any samples? No, no. We just fly over it pointed out to people and just very interesting four sided mountain. That's all they think. So I think the jury's out on that it certainly does qualify for further examination, and I would like to be the one to do that, and there are so many other locations so Linda Molnar, how is a colleague of mine as well as Dr Michael Sala, three of us speak extensively on Antarctica, and Linda has whistleblowers who have told her about some of these crashed motherships. And supposedly, there are three of them that are huge, three miles across, and they're called the Nina Pinta and Santa Maria, the nickname for the three. I've been able to pinpoint one of them in the Conan base in the old New schwabenland. German claim, Linda has pinpointed the one in the Beardmore Glacier by Spartan one and two some of her whistleblowers, and we think the third is up on the polar plateau. And got some images or reconstructions of each of those, including Google Earth of the Conan base. So also to check out where the Nazis set up their base to 11, which is what is known as an Antarctic oasis. So because of geothermal activities and all the volcanoes down there, 90, when I wrote my presentation five years ago, 91 known volcanoes. Now it's up to 93 so new discoveries continue to be made down there, which make it one of the most dynamic places on Earth, and some of the last mysteries to really be discovered. So I think it would

really make for a fascinating documentary. And this company, VC cross, is raising some money and yeah, we'd go to hit Hitler's frozen base, base 211 and new schwabenland, which is near the Schumacher ponds, these lakes that never freeze. And a temperate land right along the Mid Atlantic Ridge, which is a volcanic chain under the Atlantic Ocean, all the way up. Iceland, which is nicknamed The Land of Fire and Ice, just like Antarctica is the Land of Fire and Ice,

And, and once again, to to know that Zion science has said that, you know, there is a completely preserved forest under, under Antarctica, you know, under the the many miles of ice that's there that, you know, the the methane and things like that, seem to show the fact that, like, yeah, there's a, it was like a massive velt of Greenland that used to be there at one point. So we know that the pole shift things change. I mean, we're in the midst right now of a massive polar shift going on. Now. It's not like the world flips on axis or something like that, but we've been through micro ice ages, microclimates, all kinds of things over the last 10,000 years. So to think about what's happened over the last 100,000 something like that, over the last couple million, we're constantly moving back the timeline of humanity. It's truly

and while the magnetic poles are on the move like they've never been before in recorded history. The magnetic south pole is now off of the Antarctic continent, and the magnetic north pole is racing towards Siberia. If there was the flip of the poles, you'd know it, and that would be a pole shift, and it would certainly trigger volcanoes and tsunamis and earthquakes worldwide. Continents would rise and fall. New islands would appear, others would disappear under the waves. And keep in mind, we live on an ocean planet. 71% of the surface of Earth is water. So water would play a big factor in the erosion and the movement of the continental land masses. And indeed, as you mentioned, there have been found mega fauna and mega flora in the fossil record of Antarctica, namely a location called Mount Buckley, which is at the top of the Beardmore glacier, which I would really like to go to as well on this documentary, because dinosaur bones, which can only live in very warm climates, including some species of dinosaurs that are only found In Antarctica, proving that it must have been a sweltering jungle at one time, because the fossils have ferns and other tropical plants and dinosaurs, which are cold blooded lizards and need the warmth to exist so clearly, Antarctica or the poles moved over this land mass, and then flash froze it to the point we're at today. So what could be under the ice could really be the trigger for global disclosure? Yeah, and I think that that's why this is an esoteric subject. I think some people know this, yeah, but keeping it from the rest of us, because there's still backward Engineering Technology, or just don't think humans can handle that, or, yeah, whatever reason, but it's wrong, and we should know, and we have a right to know well,
