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Well, hello everybody and happy Tuesday night. Hope everybody is doing okay. I hope everybody in the northeast and on the coasts and everything are able to avoid the drone traffic. Our our second spot tonight, this is going to be a long episode, folks, just so you know, in our first segment, we are welcoming James shoes key to talk about cryptids in the Columbia River Gorge,



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specifically the



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click to cat, APE cat, as well as others we'll be talking about his amazing arcane adventure maps, things like that. The second spot is where it gets funky, because we actively, as you know, the second spot is always pre record guests, folks, because we don't if we go long with the first guest, we don't want to keep a guest waiting in the wings things like that. However, last Wednesday, we got with our friend Anthony SM Playa from Epic TV New York. His videos were going viral all over the place of the drones in New Jersey. News agencies were contacting him from all over the world, and we did our pre record about the New Jersey drones. And at the end of it, I was like, you know, man, guaranteed by the time this hits, this is going to be an eight 180 degree different story than what we just did, you know, um, and sure enough, by the time Sunday came around, I contacted him and was like, Anthony, do you have time to get together Tuesday morning, at like noon, you know? Like, let's get together at noon, about eight hours before the show, and let's do a recap of this, because guaranteed by then, we're going to be having hearings. We're going to be having Senate hearings, things and lo and behold, Senate hearings happen today, about the drone situation, things about radiation have come out, all that kind of stuff. And then in the midst of it, his own video, which him and his research partner did CGI with to make tracer rounds come out, like a dude was shooting at a drone to show like, what not to do, and very clearly marked as CGI started making the rounds on social media and in the news as though it was actually real. So I was like, you definitely need to come back on. So you're gonna have a two part, second part, folks. The first part is from Wednesday, the actual first conversation, so that you have reference. And then the second part is today, with all of the updates, everything that we called on Wednesday, that's all come to fruition, as well as all of the the outflow from what's happening from this and literal news agencies showing his video of the tracers being fired at a drone claiming it's real when it's absolutely not real. It's CGI. So what? What the impact of things like that is that's our second part. Once again, in our first part, we are very, very happy to welcome James shoe. He is the creator of the arcane adventure map. You can find everything out about that at margies outdoor.com they have a great, great listing here of all kinds of paranormal stuff from the Columbia River Gorge. James is a former volunteer search and rescue EMT, wildlife firefighter, a mountain guide. He is also a researcher into these topics in his area. Welcome to the show, James. How are you doing this evening? I'm great. Thanks for having me on. Absolutely. Thank you so much for coming on. Like I said, it's going to be a an amazing night of show. And I am very excited to get into this, because the Northwest is a beautiful, amazing area, and also an area that is really, really rife and rot with cryptids and paranormal and portals and straight. Generative energy vortices, things like that. So tell us a little bit about yourself. James, how did you first come to the world of being a search and rescue? EMT, things like that. I think that's really the first part of the story, because that's kind of what got you out into this region to begin with, and exploring this region in the depth that you do. Yeah,



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well, you know, when I was 19, I joined the military at a highly experimental Cold War infantry unit, and that brought me out to the northwest. And, you know, I fell in love with Washington state. You had mentioned that this place is rife with all kinds of stuff. Washington is the number one state for UFO sightings per capita and for Bigfoot sightings per capita. And so I've always been out in the wilderness, exploring, doing outdoor kinds of stuff. And I had been to the Columbia River Gorge a number of times, but in 2021 my mother in law passed away, and she

owned some businesses down here, and my wife and I decided to carry on those family businesses, and so we moved down, and one of the stores was sort of a convenience type of store, but it needed some help. Margie had started when she was sick, and so because I have all this outdoor experience, we made it an outdoor adventure store. So we have climbing ropes and backpacks and that kind of stuff. And the gorge is a place that's just perfect for that. So it's 80 miles. It was the country's first National Scenic Area. The Columbia River is the largest river in North South America that flows into the Pacific Ocean, and it cuts straight through the Cascade Mountains. And so out here, we have over 90 named waterfalls, some of them are 600 feet tall. We have three strata volcanoes within 35 miles of my store, we have, there's well over 400 caves in the area. The west side of the mountains are traditional, sort of mysterious and brooding, classic Pacific Northwest rainforest that sees over 100 inches of rain a year. But the east side of those mountains, and my store sort of sits right on the boundary. There is a high plains desert so austere and beautiful and almost spiritual in many ways. And out there you'll find, you know, like desert mesas with flat tops and channeled scab lands. And just a from an adventure standpoint, you know, there's everything from rock climbing to mountaineering to whitewater rafting. Lot of folks do wind surfing out here on the Columbia River Gorge. I mean, it is an adventurous Wonderland. And I thought that we were pretty lucky to have, you know, had some good businesses out here that we could run as a family. Well, on sort of a whim, I put a Sasquatch in part of our logo, and when we sort of reopened the store in its new format, tons of people started coming in and spontaneously telling us stories about, you know, these unusual experiences they're having in the wild reaches of the Columbia River Gorge, and we were hearing about Sasquatch. We were hearing about UFOs and portals, little people, apparitions and ghosts, glowing orbs. I mean, it seemed like everyone that we talked to either had had some kind of unusual experience or knew someone who had had an unusual experience, and so I put up a big sign in the window that read file paranormal reports here, and I gave really specific instructions to all the employees, and I said, we are going to be a safe place for ordinary people to talk about their extraordinary experiences, And we are going to treat everyone who comes in with dignity and respect. We're going to ask them intelligent follow up questions. We're going to act as though whatever they're telling us, no matter how outlandish it may seem at face value. We're going to trust these witnesses and hear them out and listen to what they have to say, and we're not going to insert what we believe they saw onto their experience. Yeah, and so, and I knew that this was important. I knew that stigma prevents people from filing reports or talking about these unusual experiences, and I think that's a hindrance to our understanding of the natural world. Yes, you know, if people are afraid to talk about their experiences, we can't study it. We can't understand it well. Now here we are. It's that program has been running for about three and a half years. We are over 380 reports in we just got four this week, in fact, wow. And if you do the math, it's sort of like a new Scooby Doo Mystery walks through our door. There a couple, three times a week. Yeah, and I have to tell you, this has been one of the most joyful, rewarding and satisfying experiences I've ever had, and it's just been amazing to be right here, where these things are happening, you know, we'll get reports that are, you know, you know, a quarter of a mile away from the store, like, these things are happening, like, right in our backyard, and it it's just been the connection we've made with the local people here is amazing, and the things that we're hearing about are just astonishing. And we can get into that in some detail, but I think that sort of gives folks a little bit of a sense of who I am and and how I got into this position. Yeah, of being sort of the the nucleus of all this astonishing information, yeah, the



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local purveyor of tales and, and the the trusted person that people come to which in a

community is hugely important, especially a community like that. You know, you mentioned something very important, and that is people's reticence to share experience. And there's one thing that we try to drive home all the time with Curious Research, and that is the idea that science begins with an experience we wouldn't have the theory of gravity. If an Apple didn't fall on Newton's head. Like, if he didn't use that experience that led down the trail of like, well, what caused that? We would have the theory of gravity. So and the idea even even coming at it from a search and rescue standpoint, if everybody that you rescued was reticent to tell you how they got lost. Yeah, you you wouldn't be able to help anybody not get lost. You wouldn't be able to tell them what they need to bring with them, what they need to look out for, make sure not to do this, you know, like, make sure not to leave your camping party, like things like that. You know, so when people are reticent to share, we can't grow a larger field of data for a topic.



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You know, it's funny, the idea of science talks about, you know, the scientific method and being intellectually curious, and that the data leads to theories. The data shouldn't, or, excuse me, theories shouldn't exclude data, right? Like and I think a lot of scientists, they have some really strong vested interest, you know, their professional reputation and funding and sure, you know, the way that they're trained and all these kind of things leads them to actually be antithetical to intellectual curiosity. But that, to me, is one of the most exciting things about what's happening in places like the gorge, citizen scientists, like scientists, academic scientists, have more or less abandoned this phenomenon, these experiences that people are having, and they've left it up to people like me, who are self funded and are intellectually curious and are willing to entertain ideas outside of the mainstream theories and and so it's it's a golden age for citizen scientists like this is a field where you're not going to bump into people in the field telling you can't research that. Or, you know, this is my turf, and you need to get out of here. And what's really fun is that all the other researchers that I've met, and you know, a lot of folks come through and visit. It's such a friendly community, like there are so many folks who are willing to help each other out and give each other a hand. And it's all really based on this intense curiosity and interest in our natural world. And we can see the limitations like, obviously, science, as materialism is practiced, is very effective. Sure we all know that there are holes in that. And if you think about the way science works, it is often the last to know, like it's going to be citizens having experiences in the field that are reporting these things. And then science has got to go through its whole process of verification. And, you know, debating, and you know there's entrenched viewpoints, and, yeah, you know you have to go through that whole process, but really it's for individuals. The most important thing I can tell you is that don't doubt that you're having an extraordinary experience. Like a lot of people, normalize it, they'll talk themselves out of it, yep. And if they don't talk themselves out of it, their friends and relatives will rapidly. Yeah, I can't tell you how many folks tell me that I am the second person they've told in 20 years and 30 years and 10 years, because the first person they told laughed at them, or, you know, told them they're crazy or they're on drugs or whatever else, yep. And yet, even 20 years later, an experience that lasted, you know, five seconds, 10 seconds, 20 seconds, is still one of the most important memories that they have, yeah. And so I think, like, one of the like I said, one of the most satisfying, rewarding, joyful parts about this is connecting with these people. And. Hearing them tell their stories and seeing the relief on their face that someone is taking them seriously and not dismissing them out of hand immediately.



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Yeah, yeah, precisely. And you know the idea of science coming on board with this number one, it's a hugely diverse biosphere up there, so I'm sure that there's tons of scientific research being done in different ways, but it is interesting to see science once again, taking kind of coming back to some of this, even the can't deny it. Well, even changing things from UFO to UAP, once again, lands things. And we say it all the time, like there's a lot of people that don't like it, but it lands it in the backyard of science, because the job of science is to eliminate the phenomena from the experiment. The prime example that I give is this awesome series of books that I have that is an actual scientific Desk Reference, printed last time in 1974 year before my birth, called strange phenomenon, strange universe, strange planet like these things are literally like this one right here is just all kinds of stuff, like lighted swamp gas in the air and articles that date back to like, 1680 1700s I love things like that. Sounds so cool. So it's like, oh, wait, okay, well, here's something that may kind of match what you're talking about. That gives you a launching point scientifically, or at least gives you, you know, like, it's, it's wicked cool, but that is an actual scientific desk reference of phenomena to to exclude from your experiments, to exclude from things really, they want you to exclude that. Well, well, it's the idea of like, okay, well, here's what happens. Here's different effects of the planet Venus. Whenever you observe it, things like that, you know. So it's things that you can go back and reference and go, Oh, you know, I remember hearing something like that about an article about ball lightning. Let me go look that up. And there's like 85 different little clippings of articles from ball lightning stuff where it's like, here's a paragraph that was written from Missouri in 1785



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to be jealous, I wish I had those books, things like that. It's like, I found



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them at a MUFON show, a big book sale. It was like, Oh my God. But the thing is, that's what science is supposed to be, yeah, when you start talking about cryptids, specifically, cryptozoology is a big one for me, because it's like, no, we, we have discovered so many species. We discover on average, 1500 a year. We didn't believe that the lowland gorilla was an actual thing. It took us 85 years from the time of us hearing about it to the time that we found it



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knew it was real. The



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whole reports of of those gorillas back in Roman times. So you're talking about 2400 years, yeah, of field reports of these creatures, and science saying, Nope, doesn't exist. Same thing with Komodo dragons. Same thing with the platypus. They even dissected a platypus and determined it was a clever hoax. And so like science has got its own momentum, its own social structure, it's a human endeavor. Of course, these are people doing their best, but they're

coming at it from sort of a colored point of view, and they pretend that they're completely objective, but they're human beings like the rest of us, sure, and you know, it's so like, for instance, Sasquatch the where Washington state has got tons of Sasquatch settings, and the gorge has got tons of Sasquatch settings for Washington State. And in fact, Skamania County, which is a part of the Washington side of the gorge was the first governmental body in the world to enact a Bigfoot protection legit. That's right. That's right. And if you, if you kill a Bigfoot in Skamania County, and it's the Coronavirus determines it's a humanoid, you'll be charged with manslaughter. So we're not fooling around out here. And so we were getting all of these amazing reports, you know, and tons of Sasquatch reports, pretty clear. But then we started getting reports of this big black cat, and the first guy that came in, you know, it took him a while to work up the courage. And he was orienteering, you know, probably three miles west of the store, and in an area called Buck Creek, his compass started acting strange. Now for the gorge, that's not entirely unusual. When you look at the government issued navigation maps, there are bright pink letters on them that say warning your compass readings will



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be off here. Yeah, you're another player in a very volcanic area. So



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yeah, and there are, it is one of the most unique electromagnetic environments in the world. We have all kinds of crazy things that go on out here. There are certain areas where compasses are almost useless. Yes. And so he then said that he saw across the creek a big black cat watching him. Now, of course, we have Cougar here. That's they're actually fairly common, but the thing to know about Cougars is that they are terrified of humans, and they will abandon a fresh kill just at the sound of human voices, yeah, and so this thing stood there and looked at him. It was sitting on the other side of the river, and didn't run away. So that's the first sign to me that, okay, we've got something weird going on here. Then it's black in color. So cougars, uh, when they express their melanin, and they go from like a tawny tan color to a red color. But there is no scientific evidence that Cougars can be black, yeah, that they're fully melanistic in any kind of way. They can have a little bit of black tinge on their tail, a little bit on their saddle, stuff like that, as they get older. But, you know, much like any never gonna see, like they're fur darlings, but yeah, fully black one. So those are two. You know, I've been in the wilderness, those are two, sort of like, okay, he's got something unusual here. And then he said, and the creature was enormous. And I said, Well, what do you mean? And he said, well, like, four to five feet tall at the shoulder. Whoa. That is remarkable, because a cougars, maybe 24 big ones, 2628 inches at the shoulder. Tiger might be 36 inches at the shoulder, and tigers are considered the largest cat on Earth today. But this thing is, you know, anywhere between you know, 48 to 60 inches tall at the shoulder. So just enormous in size, and, and so we talked about that a bit. And, you know, I'm, of course, doing my level best to take in the data and not put any judgments on it. And he said, and James, the strangest thing was that it had a face that looked like a monkey and, and so that one kind of threw me for a little bit. Yeah, what do you mean? And he said, well, it had intelligent ape like eyes, and there was no fur on its face, and its snout was kind of shortened. And I thought, wow, that is a I can't even begin to imagine. You know what that might be. I do know that there are Native American legends about a race of supernatural Panther protectors. They're called the Michelle and one of the descriptions of these creatures, and is that they look like a black panther with the face of a man. But, you

know, that's a you know, it's part of the Native American traditions. And whenever they're called Underwater Panthers, because they come from the underwater realm. And whenever Native Americans talk about thing coming from the sky realm or the underwater realm or the earth realm, they're saying that this thing has one foot in the physical world and one foot in in the spirit world. And so, like, that's the only reference I can make out for that. Now fast forward to today. We've had over 130 reports of a big black cat, and for us, it counts as a click attend a cat setting, if it is feline in body structure, it's got black fur and it's got a long tail. And so we've had 130 accounts. About half of them describe this enormous size, so four to five feet tall at the shoulder, between 913 100 pounds. And then only a handful of the reports say that it's got this monkey like face. And you know, I'll go back and forth in my own mind thinking, you know, is this? Is this a reporting error? Is it a trick of light? Is the creature maybe sick and has got mange or something like that? Yeah, and so, you know? Or maybe we're dealing with multiple creatures, or maybe it's some kind of shape shifting thing, I honestly don't know, but I do know that just about the time that I start to doubt, like, I don't know if this monkey face thing is real. Another credible witness will come in, like a fire crew chief from a wildland firefighting team will come in and say, yep, me and the whole team saw that thing when we were fighting fires between Mount Adams and Mount St Helens, and on a three day deployment, we wondered what we were going to do if it showed up in our camp. So it's a part of the story. And of course, many of these sightings happened in click attack County, which is where my store is located, and so hence the name click attack ape cat. So I was really fascinated by this story. And the next day, I came in and was talking to my employees about it. We got a really interesting story last night, really interesting report. And as I described the creature, one of my employees, who have known for years, missy, she started shaking. She was having like this visual, visual, a visceral, emotional reaction to the description of this cat. And she's a honest woman, really super likable, super nice. And I said, missy, what's going on? She said, James, I saw that thing. My. Elf. I was driving down click a dead Canyon at dawn, and I saw it walk along the side of the road, and I stopped my car and watched it, and she didn't get a look at its face, but said it was huge. It was gigantic. She had never seen a cat that big before. And of course, I'd never seen a black cat here in Washington State, the only black cats in North America are black jaguars, and their range is 1000 miles south of here in like Southern Arizona and New Mexico, yeah, and it's a pretty



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it's not a huge range either. Yeah, they're mainly from Mexico,



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exactly. And



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she thought that maybe she should get out of her car and tell the people who lived in the houses nearby that there's a giant black cat, you know, prowling around their property or near their property. She decided not to do that, and it's kind of a good thing that she didn't, because when she told her family about it, you know, her her trusted group of support group, the people that know you go to when you're trying to make sense of the world, they kind of nervously

laughed. They told her that's impossible and that she didn't probably didn't see a cat. What you probably saw was a cow. So first of all, that gives you a sense of just how big of a creature she's describing, right? Yeah, a creature the size of a cow. But it also shows how people so want to normalize experiences. And it's like, if you were in your hometown and you saw a red Lamborghini drive through town, and you're like, oh my god, Hey, dudes, I just saw a red Lamborghini. And your friend said, Yeah, well, Lamborghinis are pretty rare. What you probably just saw was a red minivan, and you were mistaken. Like, it's insane to think that you an adult wouldn't know the difference between a cow and a cat. But again, and you can't blame people like this is your natural defenses. Life is hard enough. You don't need giant black cats running around. So between these two people, the original reporting witness happened to be a friend of the family, someone that Margie had helped out before we moved down there, okay, before she died. And Missy, of course, is someone that I knew and trusted very well. So to me, these were credible reports. And so, you know, the stores got a radio advertising budget, and so we, you know, put up some ads on the radios. Has anyone seen a big black cat? We put up some signs at the trail heads, and we were flooded with reports. Well, I mean, people were coming in all over the place, and we've had multiple law enforcement officers come in and say that they've seen this cat. We've had reports that go back all the way to 1968 we have reports of the creature with younglings, so kittens and cubs. So it's a, what seems to be a reproducing population. And, yeah, so quite a bit of reports and, and some of the encounters are pretty brief, like, yeah, I was riding my ATV, and this giant black cat jumped across the trail and scared the crap out of me, and I never saw it again. So like, to me, that counts as one of those 130 reports that we've had, yeah, other people will say that they were driving in the mountains. They jumped into the road in front of their car. It was as tall as their, uh, like Ford Escort, and then jumped off. Other people say they've seen it in the road. It was tall as the hood of their Jeep, Renegade, wow. And so really big. And like I said, about 50% of their ports talk about this enormous size, and the rest of their ports a just a really big, muscular cat, so pretty much a head scratcher. I looked into the fossil record, and there is a creature called the Panther a Trox. It was the North American lion lived here in all over North America, including Washington State, said to have gone extinct 10,000 years ago as the Ice Age ended. And it's a creature incredibly well known to science. They pulled over 80 skeletons of this thing out of the La Brea Tar Pits down in Los Angeles. What's interesting about this creature, and we have one of these replica skulls in the store, is that it matches the size and weight of the creature that is being reported here in the gorge. And interestingly, the creature is sexually dimorphic, which means the females are much smaller than the males.



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And what that means is that if you had



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a sample of 130 reports, you'd expect half of them to be small and half of them to be really big. Yeah. So I'm not saying that this is a panther a trucks. What I am saying is that it is definitely genetically possible for cats to be this big, and that cats this big, lived alongside human beings in fairly recent geologic history, less than 10,000 years ago. Again, we don't know what it is and or where it comes from, or anything about it. You know, for all we know it could be an. Escaped exotic pet that has managed to, you know, thrive out here in the Pacific Northwest. And,

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you know, I guess at that point, if somebody had an escaped exotic pet, you know, it's not like it wouldn't be a hard stretch for any kind of exotic large cat to possibly cross breed with a cougar, you know, yeah, in all realization, it's not like you're talking about cross breeding a cat and a dog or something like that, you know. So, yeah, it would be, it would be interesting. And, you know, the the really interesting thing is how far back sightings go, you know, all the way back to the late 50s, early 60s, with right?

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So, you know, I've been doing a ton of research. Like, why in the heck are we getting, like, Hunt over 100 reports of this giant creature? And like, I'll be, like, getting my tires changed and talking to the young lady behind the counter, and she'll ask me about my rig. I've got a sort of a paranormal investigation vehicle that's got, you know, big logos on and everything and and I will describe this case. Oh, yeah, I saw the thing when I was 12 years old over in Doofer, on the Oregon side of the river. And so people who aren't even, you know, coming in there's my rig. Yeah, it's the cryptid, and it's got, you know, cameras and, you know, thermal imagers and, Heck, yeah.

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And it's super fun.

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But anyway, so we've heard so many stories about it. And now upriver from us is a place called the Hanford Nuclear reservation. And so it was a part of the Manhattan Project. And what Hanford was so during World War Two, everyone knows that down in Los Alamos, the Oppenheimer and his physicists were designing the bomb, but they needed a site where they could actually build an industrial scale of nuclear reactor, the first in the world to forge the plutonium that would be used to fuel the bombs. And what they did was they took over a 600 square mile area. They evicted all of the people living there, including the Native Americans and the, you know, pioneer families that had settled out there. And it's along 45 miles of the Columbia River. They needed that water for cooling and for cooling the reactor, there's some hydroelectric dams that are providing power, and it's super remote, right? And I thought, Well, right now, the place closed down in the 80s while it was operational. They had a total of nine nuclear reactors running there during the Cold War. Closed down in the 80s after they produced enough plutonium to create 60,000 nuclear weapons. It was one of our most important nuclear sites, but now it is one of. It is, without a doubt, the country's biggest Superfund cleanup site, because not only is there nuclear waste out there, there's a ton of chemical strippers that they use. So like, it is a really like, imagine the worst toxic sludge that you can possibly imagine, like, literally glowing. That's the kind of hazard This is. And I thought, Oh, well, maybe, you know, maybe this creature has interacted with some of that waste material and, you know, and that caused some kind of mutations, and so I was looking into that, and it turns out, like there's a biologist out there whose job is, it is to track radioactive bunny poop. Because the bunnies would sit by the barrels that were nuclear, reactively hot.

They'd get irradiated, and they'd hop around, and they'd have, you know, Bunny droppings that were radioactive. And these bunnies are getting eaten by coyotes and cougars and everything else and like maybe that's the connection. And then I stumbled across this article that while they were doing the cleanup in the middle of the desert, they found a railroad box car filled with the half charred, radioactive carcasses of animals just packed full of experimental lab animals. And what the hell is going on with this? Well, it turns out that Hanford, from day one, had an animal testing laboratory out there, and it was had initiated during World War Two at the very beginning of the whole Hanford Manhattan Project program. And the guy that they chose to run this animal testing program was a guy named Lauren Donaldson, and his only academic achievement that I could find before he got this assignment was that he had actually created a super animal. It's called the Donaldson super trout, and it is a fish that is eight times larger and stronger than a normal trout. It reaches sexual maturity and half the time it can swim in salt water and fresh water, and it's super survival. It's still a viable fish species today, and this is the guy that they have running their. Animal testing program and do a little head scratching and do a little research. And at the time, you know, back in the 30s and 40s, they knew that radiation could induce mutations, and we knew that Hitler was incredibly interested in Super Soldier programs and super animal programs. In fact, you know, they had trained up 200,000 German shepherds to fight alongside Nazi soldiers during World War Two Russians. The same thing they were doing human animal hybrid experiments, where they were trying to create human Z's to create super soldiers in Russia. So they were inseminating female chimpanzees with human sperm, and they were trying to inseminate human females with chimpanzee sperm. So, like, back in that time frame, not only were we worried about the bomb, but like, what would happen if the Nazis figured out how to use radiation to induce mutations to create super animals? And so this was a part of the program. Well, you know, we won the war. Interesting side note. So back in so the Hanford Nuclear Reactor went online in september of 1944



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and then in January of 1945



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we have reports from the PASCO Air Station, which is just south east of the Hanford Site. It's a Navy fighter plane. Outfit and fighter planes are getting scrambled in January of 1945 to intercept glowing orange orbs over the nuclear reactor. The pilots have no idea what what's going on in Hanford. They just know that they're chasing this orange glowing orb, and they can't keep up with it. And the SXF Hellcat was like the premier, best Navy fighter plane at the time, operational ceiling of like 37,000 feet, and this thing just completely outpaces them. And then again, in July of 1945 the same month of the Trinity test, a whole squadron of these F 6f hell cats get deployed to scramble to intercept UFOs over Hanford. Again, this time they see a craft that is, quote, as large as three aircraft carriers combined. So the history of UFOs in America goes way back to our atomic roots, and it's all right here, just up river from us. Well, we win the war. Hanford becomes a public knowledge, and then the cold war starts, and secrecy gets clamped down again, and Hanford becomes, like I said, our most important nuclear site, and Donaldson goes to the South Pacific. He's part of the Bikini Atoll test and the disastrous Castle Bravo test and all that crazy stuff that gave rise to the Godzilla mythology. And a new guy comes into the life sciences program in charge of it. His name is Bill Baer, and

when they closed Hanford in the 80s, our national park system took it over, and they did an oral history project. And so they interviewed a lot of people that worked there. And I've listened to, I think, three hours of interviews with this Bill Baer guy, and he talks about all the crazy experiments they're doing with animals and radiation, and then at one point, he talks about how they were irradiating apex predators. And then those predators escaped into the Columbia River, and they could not recapture them, and so what they had done was they were irradiating alligators. And in one of the interviews, he holds up a picture of the device they use to irradiate alligators, and it's got an alligator in it. So like this is 100% backed up by the historical record. Well, they're doing these experiments one night, six of these experimental apex predators outsmart the scientists, escape their pen and get into the Columbia River. So it's a total panic at the lab, because they're worried that, what if civilians spot these creatures in the in the water. And so they put out a press release. So we know for a fact. There's no question about it. This is 100% historically verified situation. They wind up hunting these things down, and they have this special, you know, atomic security force hunting team that's out there hunting every day for six months. They wind up catching four of them, but there's two that they can't catch. It's January. They decide, well, they'll never survive the winter, and so they call off the hunt. Well, in these same interviews, Bill Baer is saying, Yeah, even into the 80s, he was getting calls from Fish and Wildlife guys asking if he knew anything about alligators in the Columbia and he just says, No one hangs up on him. And he laughs about like, what a hilarious response that was to these questions. And so you have to ask yourself, What in the hell are they doing irradiating alligators like it makes sense that during the Atomic Age, they're trying to figure out, like, if a cow eats grass with fallout on it, is its milk safe to drink, like a really important national security or. Know, kind of question, but why are they irradiating apex predators? Well, to understand that, we have to spend a little bit time talking about dolphins. So since 1958 the US government has used dolphins to guard some of our most sensitive nuclear sites. And the reason why is that some of our nuclear sites, like the Bangor sub base up here in Washington State, one of the biggest threats is would be like a Soviet scuba diver coming in, maybe even at night, and trying to surveil or sabotage the site. And 1950s sonar technology doesn't have the fidelity to tell the difference between a tuna fish and a sea lion and a Soviet diver, but you can train a dolphin to tell the difference. And so they would attach these apparatus to the dolphins snout, sort of like this, hook, grabber, claw, and they train the dolphin to ram that into the diver, and it would clamp onto the diver. A balloon would inflate and bring the diver to the surface, and the atomic security forces would come pick it up. And this is an extremely effective program. Like it is a success story for the atomic security forces. Like we've got a great way to deal with this threat. So if you're in charge of security for Hanford, you've got a gigantic security problem, because you've got 45 miles of the Columbia River that flows right through the middle of your super sensitive nuclear site. That equals 90 miles of river coastline that you have to guard somehow. And how in the hell are you going to do that? It would be awesome if you could bring those dolphins in, because they're already trained up, and they know exactly what to do. Problem is that dolphins only operate in salt water, and so you need a creature that can operate in fresh water, because, you know, Columbia River is a fresh water river, and so if that was your job, if your job was securing Hanford, and you knew that you couldn't use dolphins, but this animal sentry program was super successful. You'd ask yourself a really simple question, what are the world's best riverine hunters? Which animals are the most successful in hunting in that kind of environment? You might try alligators, but you would definitely take a look at jaguars, because jaguars are incredibly effective riverine hunters. In fact, they are the kings of it. I've read reports that say these creatures can hold their breath for 15 minutes. They can swim a kilometer in the open ocean, pound for pound, they're the strongest of the big cats. They have night vision that's six times better than a human being. And as a bonus, they always instinctively drag their prey to shore. And the reason why those dolphins with their apparatus had a balloon that brought the divers up to the surface is because

a dead enemy diver at the bottom of the ocean or the bottom of the Columbia River tells you nothing you want to get that and gather as much information and intelligence you can from what kind of equipment he had. And so there's no question that if they were considering Sentinel animals to guard this river environment, jaguars would have absolutely been at the top of their list. And this is a time in America when they're the first a liger was born. And so, you know, it was the first tiger, lion hybrid. So what we believe happened was that they were trying to create a sentinel creature. They were using the dolphin program as a sort of a template, as a model. Let's see if you can train animals, and let's see if we can maybe modify them genetically to be more suited to the task we're asking them to do. Yeah, and you know, we think that, just like the alligators, these creatures outsmarted those scientists, they escaped into the wild. And if you look at a map of Washington State, where Hanford is, if you go north, east or south of Hanford, it is just sagebrush desert for days and days and days. If you head west into click a debt County, there's tons of available habitat and food sources, and, you know, cover and all the things that a big cat would need to survive. And so as crazy as it sounds, the most logical, reasonable, rational explanation for why we have over 130 reports of enormous black panther creatures prowling around click, a dead County and the Columbia River Gorge area is because they escaped from the animal testing program at the Hanford Nuclear lab just up river

well. And you know, granted that there were numerous animals amongst the experimentation, sheep, all kinds of stuff and the there are definite cases, like Chernobyl is a prime example. I just posted an article the other day about a fungus that they've actually found that is unique, that is not just thriving in the area, but actively living on the. Video, active material, but, but it's been, it's been in the news for the last many years. The fact that, where'd it go? I just had it up. Oh, there it is. Sharon noble has become an unexpected haven for wildlife. While it's still a crazy hot zone for us. Wolves have retaken the area, coyotes have retaken the area. All kinds of wildlife has come back in so and never really left. You know, there are breeds of dogs, stuff like that, groupings of dogs that have been there the entire time and never left. So the idea of even, even a wild animal being exposed to all of this and going through some kind of mutation breeding, and it, it continuing the cycle along the way, is not necessarily beyond, uh,



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plausibility, yeah, it comes



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to that. And again, I want to be really clear, like we're trying to make sense of the data points Absolutely. And we don't know what this thing is,



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but it's super exciting. You know, I feel like



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we have so many exact I've seen video of the creature, oh, wow, yeah. And, you know, it's kind of grainy blob, Squatch type of stuff that was posted to a Facebook group in the western gorge. Woman was out, you know, watering her plants, and she saw this large her family saw this very large cat, and she describes it. But of course, it's difficult to make out. It's one of those sort of cell phone shots that's far away, but it's definitely a black cat, like creature, long tail. She describes it as being taller than the tall grass that it's walking through, and so we're not sure what it is. And you know, we alluded to talking before the show that we're starting to get more serious about our investigations. We've put together a team out here, myself as a soldier. We have a psychic that has been helping law enforcement find the remains of dead people for since she was eight years old, and she's got clients on five continents. We've got a former preacher and a former cowboy, and together, we're going to be investigating these things next year. And, you know, getting a little more serious about how we're going to approach this, and because we have so much reticence, I'm going to be offering a pretty significant financial reward for anyone who can bring in the most compelling evidence of



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anomalous phenomenon here in the Gorge area,



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interesting, interest, and is that any phenomenon?



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Or, you know, we're gonna go and investigate it. Sure, we have a couple different categories. When I first started this program, I thought, Oh, for sure, people come in and be pulling our leg. Or, you know, and I can tell you, after 380 reports, maybe less than 10 are obviously people, you know, joking around. It's mostly just ordinary people having some kind of extraordinary experience. Well, I also thought that we'd have people with some mental health issues, and we've seen a handful of those. But I would say between those two categories, you know, jokers and people experiencing some mental health issues. That's like a less than, like, less than 2% of of the people coming in. And so the so you've got, you know, jokers, and then you get people who are enthusiastic but mistaken. So a guy sent me this really compelling trail cam image, and it looked, for all the world, like a black panther leaping. But the trail cam image we had, you know, it was taken three seconds apart, the one before it didn't show anything. Then this one is showing it, and then the one the second later, doesn't show it. And when I did some image analysis on that, realized, Oh, this is actually just a crow flying through the scene in a weird configuration, like its wings were kind of funny. And so it's important for me to, you know, debunk the things that aren't real, you know, like that are, yeah, maybe enthusiastic mistakes or misunderstandings. But, man, I will tell you there's like, we just had this UFO phenomenon. A woman took three pictures of it. This is on the Oregon side of the river, and it looks like this bright, glowing rectangle in the sky. And she observed it for five minutes. It never moved. And and then, so that's on the Oregon side of the river, the south side of the river. And then that same day, we had reports from the Washington side describing it in the exact same place, unmoving. And those reports were from three hours before. So we had this stable phenomenon

of bright, glowing light in the sky for at least three hours. And then she observed. It actually just wink out and disappear, never moved. And so our initial thought was, oh, this is some type of craft. But crafts go places, right? Yeah. And so our current theory is that it may have been some type of temporarily stable portal that had stationed itself in this area above the Moser plateau, and it was there for three or four hours and then disappeared. But we have many, many reports of portals. Some of them are like just fantastic, science fiction sounding things. One gentleman reported to me that he was driving through the desert and he saw what he thought was like the lights of an Indian Casino. And when he got close to it, he realized, no, this is a portal to someplace else, like the what he could see through the portal was in the background behind it. And then he claims to have observed a metallic black cube emerge out of this portal and then fly down the gorge at a high rate of speed, you know? And so we've had numerous situations like that. I've had some unusual experiences of time, loss and relocation while exploring some of the lava beds in this area. There's a place called Brooklyn borrows. It's an 8000 year old lava bed. It's an area about the size of the island of Manhattan and jumbled jagged rocks. Like I said, I've been professionally land navigating since I was 19 years old. And you know, in search and rescue, you have to know your stuff or people die. And so I'm very, very competent at land navigating, knowing my way I don't remember the last time I've been lost. And there's a whole set of things that you do when you're a professional land navigator. You're keeping pace count, you're keeping an eye on the sun, you're tracking landmarks like there's a whole set of things you do. And I was in this place, this giant lava bed. It's got these strange micro canyons, and it's filled with caves and moss covered rocks and these weird, stunted forests, some pools of water that are in these volcanic depressions and cavities and and I was walk this. Imagine I was in a north south trench, flying my drone. I crashed the drone at the south end of that trench, went down and collected it up and then walked to the north end of the trench, took a 90 degree turn and walked another 400 meters deeper into this lava bed. And I found another trench, and so I put up the drone and started flying up and down this trench. And then, like waking up from a dream, I realized that I had been bounced back to the original trench where I had tried crashed the drone. I have no idea, no recollection of how I got there. The amount of time that had elapsed was not the amount of time I remember walking, and my memory was seamlessly edited. And it was first. My first experience is like, wow, this is, like, completely unsettling boozling, like, when, like, imagine when you see someone's face, even if you don't know their name, if you saw their face again, you'd recognize them, right? And for me as a, you know, all this time of, you know, 10s of 1000s of hours in the wilderness when I'm in a place like a wilderness here, yeah, I have that same kind of facial recognition. It's like, I know this place, like it's never a question for me. And but this is the first time, like, since I was 19 years old, where I legitimately have no idea how I got where I was, and the fact that I was in a place that I had already been and studied, like I had flown the drone back and sure, with up and down this thing, sure. And then I got there, and it was the same experience of, like waking up from a dream, and like realizing, oh my gosh, like, I'm in my bed, you know, so very weird, also kind of exciting, like hundreds of people have confided in me their stories, and I've been hearing about these extraordinary experiences, and now it's happening to me in real time. Now this place we we caught, like I said, broke leg burrows. We've had numerous Sasquatch reports. We've had over a dozen people go missing in this area, local hunters won't go in there. Compasses don't work. Cell phones don't work. It's a it's a weird spot, but there are no hiking trails in there either, because it's super dangerous. And if you wanted to, you could hide like seven Ewok villages of Sasquatches in there, and no one would ever know. Yeah, and after I sort of got over my bewilderment that I had been so incredibly turned around in the wilderness. My next thought was, you know, if something had bounced me out, if something had, you know, plucked me up and put me back at start. This was probably the most benevolent way that that could have been done, like no harm was done to me. I was placed close to where I had entered and, you know your place, I could see my car, my my paranormal

investigation rig, from where I had been relocated to. And I thought, Well, do you know that's kind of, you know, nice, like, if they didn't want me to know, or today wasn't the day that I was supposed to be in there, that was probably the kindest, most benevolent way to sort of set that boundary. And sure, that day,

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you know it, it loops us back to our beginning of the conversation, which is phenomena, James, and the idea of that, and the the idea of, yeah, being in a place like, I'm huge into rocks and minerals, things like that. And the one thing that you get in largely volcanic areas, stuff like that, is magnetite, magnetite, by the boat loads. So, yeah, it's, it's pretty common for lava fields, things like that, to make compasses go wonky and people get lost, and even brain fog stuff like that. You know, in high magnetic environments, it's

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interesting. You say that, you know, they've recently discovered that we have magnetite crystals in our brains. They're in structures called magnetosomes. And back in the 80s and 90s, Dr Michael Persinger, up in the Laurentide University in Ontario, did studies about what happens if you manipulate magnetic fields around the human brain. He created a helmet solenoids in it, and he was able to reliably replicate paranormal experiences, things like a sense presence, or being able to turn fear on and off like a switch. And because the gorgeous electromagnetic environment is so unique, it makes me wonder if, when people come here, one of the reasons why this is emerging as one of the most active paranormal hot spots in North America is that these magnetic, electromagnetic properties, these fields, are adjusting our perceptual tuners. Sure, and we're perceiving things here that we normally don't perceive. Imagine if your car radio was perpetually stuck on a country music station all your life, country music, and you didn't know that you could change the station. And then one day, that electromagnetic tuner was adjusted slightly, just a little bit, and suddenly, instead of your reality including country music, it included classical music or rock and roll music. Those signals were always present in your environment, but you were not tuned to receive them. And so one of my leading theories about the gorge is that this is a place where your tuner can get adjusted, and you may not even know it, and suddenly you're perceiving things that have an independent reality. I mean, we have photographs of the stuff, we have footprints, we have hair samples, you know, we've got co witnessed events, so I don't think they're personal hallucinations. Yeah, I think we're turning you we're tuning into things that we are normally not tuned to. And that's why so many people are having really astonishing experiences out here. Yeah,

yeah, precisely. And that's just it. And we are. It's one of the things that I talk about at conferences, one of the things I talk about at shows regularly, whenever I guest on shows, talking about binaural beat music, things like that. And it is the fact that science is rapidly coming to the world of the paranormal and with things like specifically quantum entanglement winning the Nobel Peace Prize two years ago, the idea of two particles influencing, influencing, influencing each other despite difference, let me get that out of my mouth, Chase god man. But

that constant twisted, well, it's the idea that, you know, yeah, we are connected in a different way, and that we only see 440 nanometers of the electromagnetic spectrum. We only hear 20,000 from 20 hertz to 20,000 hertz. That's it. There's a whole nother panoply of sounds beyond that. So it's really much more like the fact of Imagine if visiting this place, you suddenly receive a few more frequencies on your whole receiver. Is more what it's like. You know, it's more like you visited there and suddenly you had side band reception in addition to am FM, you know, you could hear ham radios and people talking, you know, stuff like that. Because that's literally what it is, is there's, there's a whole nother band, a whole nother dimension of things out there that's a bubble of reality that's right up against ours. James, you're right. That's quite literally what we're getting into in science now. And it's fascinating, and it's, it's incredible when, even whenever you start talking about magnetite fields, and heck, just the idea that the Earth's magnetic pole is beyond ready to flip, like, literally flip, right now, cooking. Um, so. So it's, it's a crazy world out there, and all of these things lead to stuff and this, this has been an amazing conversation. James, thank you so much for your time. I'd love to have you on again and again and again. This has been super great because the the idea of having places like this that are anomalous hot spots where more than one thing happens, where, where you even have geologic hot spots, stuff like that. It's absolutely awesome. James, let everybody know where they can go to find out more about the the map of the arcane, where they can go to make their reports in the Columbia Gorge area, all that kind of stuff, or they can come to find your shop,



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sure. So the best place to start is marges outdoor.com or marges outdoor store.com they both take you to the same place. We're on Facebook and YouTube and Instagram, and honestly, our game could be better in both of those places, but coming up next year, we're going to be really focusing on it, and like I said, we have assembled a really strong team. We're going to be filming a lot of these investigations of the reports that come in. We're going to be offering financial rewards for people who can provide compelling evidence. And so if you just follow those social feeds, or, you know, check in on our website regularly. We'll start updating folks with all that, because, you know, the things that are happening out here are, first of all, they're astonishing. Second of all, people are gathering physical evidence of them. And what we hope to do with the show when we start, you know, publishing these, these videos of the investigations, is to include the audience in those investigations and have them help us out with some of the background research on some of the areas and things like that. So stay tuned in terms of the maps right now, they're only available in the store. 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anomalies we're just talking about. The geologist, it is epic, like we're talking biblical floods and an apocalypse of fire, and I'm not even exaggerating a little bit. Like the things that have happened to form this gorge are on a scale that is unimaginable to a human mind, like where my store is located right now. 10,000 years ago, there were floods that were 800 feet deep rocketing through the gorge and so and and the we talked about magnetism and the moving poles, like it's all in there. And I'd love to spend more time chatting with you about it, but I think we're out of time absolutely

There have been sightings above DFW. There have been sightings in the UK. And as we've said on social media, it's pretty interesting how all of these sightings start right after we announce the fact that we have a weakness like they didn't necessarily, technically announce it, Anthony, but they definitely were like, well, you know, we aren't really talking a lot about the UFO UAP thing, because, well, it exposes a weakness over our sensitive areas. And then suddenly we have droves of drones all over and not just small drones, big drones like this that are 20 feet almost in in diameter. This is a huge, circular drone, and granted drone, period, folks. It has FAA lights, all that kind of stuff. So it is. It's not like the aliens came in from intergalactic space and forgot to cut off their headlights, right? This is something. This is human technology. It's our it's either our technology or technology of an enemy. And you know, you've been doing this for a long time. Anthony, how did you first come to the world of recording these anomalies, recording these things in the sky,



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back in 1993 I had a sighting out here on Staten Island. And you know, like anyone else that had an encounter, lead you down this path where you want to learn more about it and what's going on. So, you know, I picked up my first camera, I'd say, two and a half, three years after that first encounter, and I never stopped looking up after that. It's just been one camera after another in my hand, and now I'm using multiple at one time, to try to catch multiple objects in different directions, if possible. But this particular object here over New Jersey and Bridgeton, my colleague, Robert Earl white, he has a show the order of light. He's actually holding the camera filming this. And we're talking about an SUV sized UAV, an unmanned aerial vehicle just coasting through the sky like nobody's business over residential areas. And what's very disconcerting about that, if this UAV malfunctions or goes haywire and crashes, we're going to have some serious damage. Yeah, we're not going to know who to pin it on, because right now, we don't know who it belongs to. I mean, I know that you but I'm of the belief that it could be a military or maybe a special access faction within the military, somebody they subcontracted to, probably makes a little more sense. And I think they're just testing it out over civilian areas, because sometimes that is a requirement for licensing from the military, and they do do that from time to time, if you research it, but the amount of them that are going over homes, you think somebody would have made a statement by now, like, hey, look, it's us. It's a top secret program. We can't fill you in on why we're doing it, but it is us. You have nothing to be alarmed about, because why would want the public in an uproar like this? Yeah, it's crazy. Well, in



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the prime example that you're talking about, especially with that testing, if you remember, up around 2013 2014 there was a big thing about a whole bunch of observation balloons, like, like big blimp type balloons with observation platforms all over the country, and that was because they were getting ready to be deployed down here on the southern border, all that kind of stuff. But they had to be tested. They had to be tested once again, in a public space, in a space where, you know, if it falls, sadly, folks, I'm sorry to say you're the guinea pig, exactly. It's something that we discuss regularly. Unfortunately, there is zero law that protects you from the federal government experimenting on you. There is zero law that protects that if



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it is the government, and one of them go down into your into your roof, your house, and it's going to be on your own, homeowners insurance, their own. S Yeah, so



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yeah. And I guess you could call it act of God. Is the government God?



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I think so. I think



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at this point, well then I mean, another prime example is the fact of how we found out about area 51 and the disclosure of that, Anthony, it was because of off burning of chemicals and off burning of stealth materials that went downwind and gave people cancerous tumors and things like that, and then they had to be like, Well, yeah, sorry, you live downwind from an experimental site. And yes, it's called area 51 it is. Here's your lawsuit. And even even in the recent in the recent hearings, we heard about people who were paid for injuries while in recovery programs. But we can't talk about the recovery program, right? You know, and bringing it back around. Once again, hearing there that, well, we have this sensitive area, and all these sensitive areas that apparently have a huge weakness in them. And suddenly, once again, we start seeing drones directly over these areas, like right here, where this drone is, right down the road. Is the New Jersey Naval Station, all that kind of stuff, you know, whenever you're looking at DFW and all that, where the where the big drones were sighted here, all that kind of stuff, and where the recent flap happened in DFW. You have the Lockheed Martin facility right there in DFW, right down the road at the Air Force Base, so not too



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far from Dover Air Force Base, either right there in Bridgeton, down by Vineland, either very close, yeah, and I think it's multiple bases doing testing nationwide, even worldwide, because we're seeing drone reports come in from London now. So we have military bases overseas. We could just be testing them all out in one big rollout. That's probably what this program is, a big rollout to these massive drum programs. Yeah, precisely.



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And even, even the fact that you know this is something that not a lot I know, and like we said, pre pre interview, this is something that people like MUFON do. This is why people like MUFON and Norfolk and stuff like that. Say like please, please share with us as much detail as possible, because and any sighting, any sighting, even if it proves to be fully explainable, because when you see something and say something, somebody else may see something and say something, and. And I'm showing right now a picture that the two of you took the same night of the same thing, that you were triangulated to the point that you you now know that y'all were looking at the same object,



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correct? My partner, Robert and I, Robert, are white. We are triangulating UFOs from state Island to New Jersey right now. So when a craft comes over my area in state Island, I contact Robert, I give him latitude, longitude, Course Settings, and we try to pick up the same craft, and we've had some success with that. As you see, this is just a photo, but we have video as well. The same exact red, gigantic red orb that flew over my location. Flew over his location. We were able to get it, triangulate it, and both get it on film, video, the whole nine yards, and we were able to observe the same object, which is rare, very rare, yeah,



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yeah, precisely. And especially the fact that you're able to triangulate that once again, that is why citing reports are hugely important. That's why letting letting other people know, because it's, as we say, as Curious Research, whenever we're on shows like research doesn't happen in a vacuum. If you don't like you can be out in your backyard all night, but if you don't have somebody that you trust, that you can bounce it off of, that, that you can, that you can trust with anything that you send them. Now granted, as we talked about a couple weeks ago with the recent Lou Elizondo kerfuffle about the the mothership picture in his presentation. You know well, and it's one of those, yes, as somebody in the world of intelligentsia, you, you would hope the fact that he doesn't get to the point that he just puts things out unvetted. But the thing is, when it's when something comes in from a vetted source, Anthony,



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this is what frightens me about these UAP hearings and having the same people come up and speak all the time, because the same way Lou Elizondo, he had a little mishap with that mothership, but he spoke about it to the masses as if it was an actual mothership. Now, what if he told Congress that in a skiff that I'm telling you this is a mothership? I guarantee it. Yeah. And it's, it's a lens flare of a light fixture reflecting in a mirror behind you, projecting itself onto another image. I mean, how did you not know that being in the intelligence field, that's so easy to you know, well, how did you not just continue that



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out? How did you not just throw it into a John Greenwald from the black vault figured it out within five minutes with the reverse image search on Google, or



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even Nick, even Nick West would have figured that out in seconds. Yeah.



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So, so, you know, the question does come to bear? And you know that is one of those things of like, that's why you have somebody that you work with, but also why you double check your buddy's stuff, and why you're okay with your buddy saying, like, this isn't what you think it is.



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You know, even when you release it to the masses, I always tell the general public, let us know your thoughts down below. Or if you ever seen anything like this, and track something like this, we want to hear from everybody now. This was an exceptional piece over the ocean here on

Staten Island. Yeah, this, this particular object. It's about 100 maybe 150 feet wide, just sailing over the ocean, and it just gets to a point where it completely de materializes, out of sight. And, you know, people ask all the time, well, how do I know it's not the International Space Station or satellite?



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That's not the space station? No, the space station



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actually makes a double diamond projection in camera lens. But these particular objects, we track everything in space, from satellites to non manned aerial vehicles to planes. We have flight tracker up heavens above, all these different apps, and we're reading everything that's coming in, and this is none of the above. Now I'm not saying that this can't be a top secret satellite that we don't know about, but when we saw this object and what it did and how it de materialized into nothing, really, really was shot



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more than that, and there's some camera shake and things like that, and what's going on. But also, if you look at the it's way too slow to be a satellite number one, right?



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Satellites travel at the same speed, like 17,000 miles per hour on a straight pass. Yeah? That was my fault for pulling it off the tripod, but I'm trying to follow it, because it's actually



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turning past the angle of your tripod Right, right.



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But that particular craft is coming down and moving to the left and swinging back to the right, yeah? And on this weird pattern, and we catch these trans medium objects every now and again, and they're over the ocean, and right before they touch the water, they de materialize, which is another shock, see



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fascinating and that you know, once again the video that we were just showing, here's a much. That are right here at the beginning. And once again, the speed at which it's moving, the the

speed at which it's moving from that star down like that is that that's nowhere near the speed of a typical satellite in the air. No. And it also would not be as bright whereas the background stars, it wouldn't be brighter than the background stars.

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Absolutely, satellites are very dim, faint, white. Yeah. Now the now, sometimes people do confuse satellites for UFOs. It's signaling me and they'll see a flash. Yep, nine times out of 10. That's just a satellites, array system, solar, excuse me, solar array system glinting, either in the moonlight or the sunlight up in space, and you get that reflection, it gets very bright, and then it dims back out. That does happen from time to time, and you know it's a satellite when that happens. But these objects, they're illuminated from the inside, extremely bright to the eye. You don't even need night vision or a camera to see it. You just see the thing floating through the sky. It's massive. You can't miss it. My favorite ones are the ones you can't see with the naked eye that only the night vision and Fleur can pick up. Those are really ones that make your hair stand up on the back of your neck

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well. And you sent us this one as well, which is which is fascinating. So

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this one, this one really threw me for a loop for many years. Still to this day, that's right over Fort Earl, naval weapon station in New Jersey, over the ocean. And the kick it to this is, I'm using a psionics color night vision camera, and it's only visible in the night vision spectrum. Now, two and a half hours prior to this sighting, there was a SpaceX launch in Florida, which would not be visible to me here in Staten Island, New York. But what's a little hard to see in this dubbed video, out of that cone of light, there's actually little orbs of light that are being released from this thing, very tiny. You really have to pay attention. Maybe as the video goes further out, you'll get a little more, uh, better see it did. I think this was a tick tock copy I made it from. But there's these little orbs of light twinkling, releasing over the ocean. Still to this day, have no idea what it is called. Everybody called SpaceX, called the military base, more than seven times sent correspondence, their letters, emails, and I just keep getting the run around. You have to speak to this person or this person or that person, and I never get any answers. But I have no idea what that object was. Just amazing to see, though. Yeah,

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yeah. And once again, the the definition of it is pretty fascinating. And again, the size of it, the size of it, is massive, massively, huge. And and the fact that it's only visible within the infrared spectrum, it's only visible in the night vision, not whenever you just turn the camera on, on its own and your psionic stuff, is great.

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Let's camera. Let's get

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in for a second. Let's get into some of the techniques that you're using and some of the equipment that you are using. Anthony,

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I, I use two psionics cameras. I have a cyan X Aurora Pro and I have a psionics Aurora black, which are both 780 p quality. However, the the pro version is just a little clearer than the black version. And I set them up side by side in different, you know, directions in space, and I just let them film nine times out of 10. I'll let them go for, you know, 1520 minute intervals, yeah. And then I'll take a peek, see if I see anything in there. If I do, maybe I'll hit it with the the eye lot IR laser beam or not, depending on what the object is. And in between them, I set up a FLIR camera, because I want to see if I can catch anything coming off the water in that spectrum of light and going up into the sky and in the FLIR and the night vision to just dynamite well.

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And you would also, at that point, especially with the FLIR, not so much the night vision, but with the FLIR specifically, you would get any kind of exhaust range like that. You would, yeah, if, even if it was the fact, if it was a diminished exhaust, you would see a heat difference between the object and where the thrust is coming from. Now

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the only problem, and I recently learned this thanks to one of our congressional hearings with the flea cameras. If you have an object that's there, it could be reflection of a heat plume from another object miles away, reflecting both clouds and things of that nature. So now I added that to my tool kit, and I really make myself aware, and I only take that thing out now when it's crystal clear, no clouds in the in the sky at night, I use, actually, a camera now, because if there's clouds, I really don't want to take the chance that something's reflecting from somewhere else. Yeah,

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and that's just people. People, really I and, you know, it's no fault of their own. Anthony, you know, whenever I say, like, people don't understand, yeah, people don't understand. Because it's not their job to understand. It's not their job to understand like it is for me, whenever I answer to a client, what that glare is in the video that they you know, I have to be able to explain how a light from the side wash of stage might hit the lens and create a glare inside of the lens. You know how that is an absolute possibility to happen all that kind of stuff, you know. But, you



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know, filming all these, you know, I've been very fortunate and blessed. Thank God. You know, I work with Darcy Weir. He's a film director, UFO film director, and a lot of the footage we're seeing tonight, it's been in a couple of his recent documentaries. And you know, you got to be blessed to know people like that. Look at this. Now, at first I'm saying to myself, I got a TR, 3b I got one of these Aurora craft. This thing made absolutely no noise, and then you can actually see it lift. Now, excuse me for the fuzz that's on there, because I'm so far zoomed in. It's so deep in space. But when you play it from the beginning, you actually watch it coming down, and then you'll watch the nose light dip up and it kind of levels off, yeah, which is amazing. It's under intelligence.

You see that left rear light kind of pulled down, like it's correcting itself.



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Whatever it is. It's one object, Oh, absolutely, absolutely, if it was a plane or military, it would have to have that FAA light on it, and we just don't see that.



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And you know that is something that you you might be able to miss it at an oblique angle because of a brighter light, the the brighter side wing light that might be, you know, drowning it out, something like that. But you won't miss it in on a doubt trajectory, well, and you also won't, you also won't miss it in night vision, no way, because, because that place will get past the glare. Yeah, distinctive. So, so, yeah, to see this, to see the fact that there is none of that, and once again, to see that that first, that first light and the trailing light on the back end both move at the same time, shows you that they're both moving on same plane, correct? It's and



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to be silent, Yeah, completely silent, yeah, that's it. Really makes all your hair stand up when you're alone and you're out on the beach and nobody's out there with you and it's two o'clock in the morning or something like that, flies over. I mean, it's really, really make your hair stand up. Yeah, yeah. Really get you thinking,



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absolutely, man. And you know, there is, there is so much out there. There's so much out there, Anthony, and the great thing is that things like the psionic system, I mean, you don't even have to go psionics to get something like this, like you could go out and buy, like, \$150 night vision

monocular, and even those things record, to record the SD card and stuff like that nowadays,



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gen one, gen two, Gen three, night vision, Whatever you could afford that could pick up that spectrum of light. It'll work. It really will. And even



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now, the FLIR cameras for phones and stuff like that, like, I think I'm picking up like a buck 25 or something like that on the Amazon flash deal, you know,



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great, great little attachment. I have it and I utilize it. It's great.



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I will say it annoys me that no matter what you do, it says FLIR in the corner,



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but does can't get rid of that, even on the same list self promoters.



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But it's amazing to see where the technology has come and even now. I don't know if you have a made our system, I have a made our system here at home. It's pretty incredible. I'm getting ready to reach out to them, to have them on the show. It's a, I want to say, I got it from Kevin Day. He was tied with those guys as they were developing it. It's a, it's a really cool Raspberry Pi based system that has specifically a reader for the magnetosphere in it. So it basically picks up Magnetospheric anomalies in your location, and it sets up a huge node. So basically, your system is a node within a larger system. So I know, like there is, there are now, within the last year that I've gotten it, there's another person in Austin that has one and one right up the road. So here locally, there's three of us. Yeah, made our M, A, D, A, R, and it is, it is absolutely cool. It's a few 100 bucks. I think it was like 250 or something like that. But it's cool. You can go in on the made our map, and you can, you can see if there are hits that happen in your area, when the last Magnetospheric hit was that was an anomaly, you know, stuff like that. So they can, literally, if there are enough of these, they can track if that Magnetospheric anomaly moves across Texas. Wow, you know, if it's just a flip that pops up. Maybe it's just something that, you know, meteorite that came through the atmosphere, you know. So you can compare that to other meteorological data and everything else, and find out if that disturbance in the magnetosphere was a sprite, you know, from a storm or something like that. Technology
